I. General:

1. Scope – Furnish all labor, materials, and equipment necessary to perform mechanical vegetation removal at one (1) location, Canal #1, at the Hopkinton-Everett Lakes Project totaling approximately 1.3 acres. See Exhibits A - I. This work shall include the cutting, removal, mulching or chipping of brush, shrubs, and trees according to the site location and description. No cutting shall occur between April 15, 2024 and October 31, 2024, to comply with Federal Time of Year Restrictions on tree cutting. Due to higher potential for flooding in this area felled trees shall not remain in worksite area for prolonged period of time. Work shall be performed Monday through Friday 7:00 AM to 4:00 PM unless otherwise approved by the TPOC. No work shall be done on weekends or Government holidays. 5. a. Accident Prevention Plan:

The Contractor shall prepare an Accident Prevention Plan (APP) specific to the activities being performed. It shall include Activity Hazard Analyses (AHAs) as described below. A non-mandatory, fillable APP template is available upon request. However, the Contractor is permitted to submit their own plan, at a minimum it must meet the requirements of EM 385-1-1, Appendix A.

A preparatory meeting shall be conducted by the Prime Contractor to discuss the APP contents with all affected onsite employees. The Prime Contractor is responsible for informing their subcontractors of the safety provisions under the terms of the contract, the penalties for noncompliance, and inspecting subcontractor operations to ensure that accident prevention responsibilities are being carried out.

b. Activity Hazard Analysis:

An AHA shall be submitted for each major phase of work. A major phase of work is defined as an operation involving a type of work presenting hazards not experienced in previous operations or where a new subcontractor or work crew is to perform the work. The analysis shall define all activities to be performed, identify the sequence of work, the specific hazards anticipated, and the control measures to be implemented to eliminate or reduce each hazard to an acceptable level. The AHA shall be continuously reviewed and revised to address changing site conditions as appropriate.

c. Emergency Response:

Emergency procedures shall be documented in the APP and will include a map with directions to the nearest hospital, emergency contact numbers, and onsite First Aid/CPR responders.

d. Required Personnel:

The Contractor shall employ a minimum of one Competent Person (CP) at each project site to function as the Site Safety and Health Officer (SSHO). The SSHO shall be present at the project site and report to the contractor's upper management. The SSHO is required to have related service experience and have at a minimum completed a 10 Hour OSHA training.

In addition, when emergency medical services are not accessible within five (5) minutes of the work location and there are two (2) or more workers onsite, <u>at least two (2)</u> <u>employees shall be trained in First Aid and CPR</u>. Minimum qualifications are listed in EM 385-1-1, Section 03.A.02.c.

Note: Other Competent or Qualified Persons may be required per EM 385-1-1 and/or other sections of this Performance Work Statement, based on the characteristics of the tasks.

e. Accident Reporting:

All accidents and near misses shall be investigated by the Contractor. All work-related recordable injuries, illnesses, and property damage accidents (excluding on-the-road vehicle accidents), in which the property damage exceeds \$5,000.00, shall be verbally reported to the TPOC within four (4) hours of the incident. Serious accidents as described in EM 385-1-1 Section 01.D shall be immediately reported to the TPOC. ENG Form 3394 shall be completed and submitted to the TPOC within five (5) working days of the incident.

The Contractor shall compile employee work hours (including subcontractors) and forward the total hours to the TPOC no later than close of business on the 10th calendar day of the following month. The method of transmission by the Prime Contractor to the TPOC shall be electronically.

6. Specific Safety Section(s) – Specific safety requirements shall be followed if applicable. The following list identifies potential subjects/activities/equipment that may require additional safety planning and requirements if the contractor utilizes such for work related to this Performance Work Statement. The list identifies sections of EM 385-1-1 and may not cover all methods that could be utilized to complete the required work. It is the Contractor's responsibility to ensure all work activities are completed in accordance with the requirements of EM 385-1-1.

c. Tree Maintenance and Removal:

- i. All tree maintenance and removal activities are required to be completed in accordance with EM 385-1-1, Section 31. The work shall be completed by a Qualified Tree Worker who through related training and on the job experience, is trained on the proper use of the equipment, specialized techniques, and associated hazards. Acceptable credentials for a Qualified Tree Worker include but are not limited to: Certified Arborist, Licensed Tree Expert, Certified Tree Care Professional, Certified Tree Climber, and Certified Utility Safety Professional.

II. Technical Requirements:

Part 1 General:

1. Summary –Furnish all labor, materials, and equipment necessary to perform mechanical vegetation removal at one (1) location, Canal #1 at the Hopkinton-Everett

Lakes Project totaling approximately 1.3 acres. See **Exhibits A - I**. This work shall include the cutting, removal, mulching or chipping of brush, shrubs, and trees according to the site location and description. This work shall also include removal of all downed woody debris within the work area. Access to the work area will require driving on rip rap and safety precautions will need to be taken. There may be trees that exhibit higher hazard to personnel, property or infrastructure in their condition or precarious location that are included in this work. Work may be in wet areas, on riprap stone or steep slopes depending on the site conditions. Contractor's work and responsibility shall include, but not be limited to, all job planning, programming, scheduling, administration, inspection, personnel, equipment, vehicles, fuel, materials, supplies, supervision, and quality control necessary to perform the various services required herein.

2. Submittals – Although the Government reviews submissions required by this Performance Work Statement, it is emphasized that the Contractor's work must be completed using proper internal controls and review procedures. The Government reserves up to 5 days for review and acceptance on each submittal/resubmittal from the date of receipt. If revisions are necessary to the submittals, the Contractor shall make such revisions and shall resubmit to the Government in an acceptable form within 5 days of the Government's response, unless additional time is granted by the Government in writing.

The documents identified below must be prepared in accordance with the applicable standards, submitted to the TPOC for review and must be accepted by the Government.

Pre-work: Submitted within 10 days of contract award. Submittals must be accepted prior to the commencement of any field work activities.

- **3.** References All work shall be in conformance with:
 - a. U.S Army Corps of Engineers
 - **i.** EM-385-1-1 Safety and Health Requirements Manual, U.S. Army Engineering Manual.
 - **b.** Code of Federal Regulations
 - i. Title 36 Parks, Forests, and Public Property; Chapter III, Part 327 Corps of Engineers, Department of the Army.
 - c. State of New Hampshire (RSA)
 - i. RSA 227-J:10 Slash Law
 - **d.** Other appropriate federal, state, and local codes for such an installation.

- **4. Other Contracts** The Government may undertake or award other contracts for additional work not related to this contract, and the Contractor shall fully cooperate with other contractors and Government employees. The Contractor shall not commit or permit any act which will interfere with the performance of work by another contractor or by Government employees.
- **5. Preferred Sequence for Work Schedules** The Contractor must provide sufficient personnel and equipment to accomplish services stated in the contract. The Contractor will coordinate a work schedule for each service, and approximate times for beginning and ending of each required service listed with the TPOC. Any changes or alterations to the schedule must be coordinated and approved by the TPOC in advance of actual schedule changes.
- 6. Clean Up and Waste Disposal The Contractor shall practice good housekeeping to maintain a safe job site. The Contractor shall keep the work area, including any designated storage areas free from accumulation of waste materials. Upon completing work in an area, the Contractor shall remove any tools, equipment, and materials that are not the property of the Government. Any and all disturbed areas resulting from Contractor activities shall be restored by the Contractor to the satisfaction of the TPOC. All waste material will be disposed of offsite in accordance with all federal, state, and local regulations.
- 7. Environmental Protection Containers for excess and/ or waste materials, rubbish, etc. shall be provided by the Contractor at the site, and the site will be inspected/ cleaned daily when working onsite. Water, air, and land resources shall not be adversely impacted during the course of the work. The Contractor will take necessary steps to ensure all federal, state, and local environmental regulatory requirements are met at no additional cost to the Government. Assurance of compliance with this section by subcontractors shall be the responsibility of the Contractor.
- **8. Personal Protective Equipment** It is the Contractor's responsibility to furnish and supply personnel with the proper personal protective equipment necessary for performing the work.
- **9. Government Resources** The Government will provide gate access to all necessary locations. There is not a restroom available at the contract site, and there is no access to potable water at the contract site. The Contractor would have to provide these resources or have an acceptable alternative plan for these resources. The Government will assist in restricting public access to potentially unsafe work areas.
- **10. Damage to Government and Private Property** The Contractor shall be responsible for restoring all Government facilities or structures damaged as a result of the Contractor's operation. The Contractor shall also be responsible for any damage to private property or injury to any person as a result of the Contractor's operation. The Contractor shall notify the TPOC immediately of damage to Government and private

property and injury to any person resulting from the Contractor's operation. Also, the Contractor shall notify the TPOC of damage to Government facilities due to vandalism or other causes on the day such damage is first noticed. Trucks and/or trailers will be driven on existing roads only and not across or through park areas to facilities. The Contractor shall also restore landscape features (shrubs, flowers, grasses, etc.), which are damaged or destroyed by the Contractor's operation. Damaged or destroyed grass areas shall be re-planted as directed by the TPOC, and shrubs and flowers which are damaged or destroyed shall be replaced from nursery stock of like size and kind.

11. Contractor's Qualifications –

a. Experience -

i. The Contractor shall be able to demonstrate at least 3 years' experience with Mechanical Brush and Tree Removal.

b. License and/or Certifications -

- i. All work shall be performed by Qualified Personnel
- **ii.** The Contractor shall have the appropriate current license/certification issued by the State for the work required and equipment being used and shall obtain and comply with any other necessary licenses, certifications, or permits prior to beginning any work.
- **iii.** The Contractor shall provide documentation of the appropriate licenses and certifications to the TPOC.

12. Contractor's Personnel -

a. Minimum Personnel Requirements - The Contractor shall provide an adequate number of fully qualified personnel to perform the specified service properly and efficiently within the time limits specified. The Contractor shall provide a list of the names and contact phone numbers for all employees prior to them working on Government Property.

Note: At least one (1) of the Contractor employees on site shall be able to communicate effectively and efficiently with project staff.

b. Employee Conduct - The Contractor shall be responsible for seeing that the Contractor's employees strictly comply with Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Title 36, Chapter III, Part 327, and all federal, state, and municipal laws. Any personnel activity, which, in the opinion of the Government, is deemed detrimental to the performance of the contract may result in the removal of Contractor employee(s).

Examples of unbecoming actions or conduct include but are not limited to the following:

i. Cursing, harassment, or discrimination of and/or unwarranted physical contact with visitors, USACE personnel, or other contractors

- **ii.** Recurring written and/or verbal complaints from visitors, USACE personnel, or other contractors.
- iii. Unsafe operation of vehicles while on USACE property.
- c. Removal of Contractor's Employees The TPOC may require the Contractor to immediately remove from the work site any employee of the Contractor or subcontractor, who, in the opinion of the TPOC, who endangers persons or property, or whose physical or mental condition is such that it would impair the employee's ability to satisfactorily perform assigned work. Notification to the Contractor shall be promptly made in writing if time and circumstances permit. Otherwise, notification shall be verbal or by telephone, and shall be confirmed in writing as soon as possible. No such removal, however, will reduce the Contractor's obligation to perform all work required under this contract, and immediate replacement will be made as required. This requirement shall not be made the basis of any claim for compensation or damages against the United States or any of its officers or agents.
- 13. Quality Assurance The Contractor is responsible for the quality control of the contract work. The Contractor shall establish and maintain a quality control system to assure compliance with the contract requirements. The Government has the right to inspect and test all items called for by the contract, to the extent practicable always and at all places during the term of the contract.

14. Inspections-

- **a.** Contractor Quality Control The Contractor is responsible for establishing and maintaining an adequate quality control system to satisfactorily inspect and ensure that all work performed by the Contractor's organization in each separate service is in full compliance with this contract and the instructions, provisions, specifications, drawings, and maps herein.
- b. General Inspection Upon the completion of each service requirement, the Contractor will perform an inspection of all areas under this contract to ensure compliance with the Performance Work Statement. The Contractor or their representative must be able to commit personnel, equipment, and resources to correct deficiencies. A Government representative may accompany the Contractor on an inspection of completed work and will identify any contract deficiencies. Any deficiencies noted will be corrected within original contract time frames or appropriate deductions in payment will be made.
- c. Equipment/Supplies Inspections The TPOC may inspect required equipment and, supplies at any time when in use on Government property. Any equipment found deficient shall be removed from service immediately until faulty conditions have been corrected and passed by the TPOC. No such removal will reduce the Contractor's obligation to perform all work required within the time scheduled under this contract. This requirement shall not be made the basis of any claim for

- compensation or damages against the United States or any of its officers or agents.
- **d. Government Inspections** The Government will monitor the Contractor's service performance and make deductions accordingly.
- **15. Receiving and Storing Materials** The Contractor is responsible for protecting any stored material until it is placed in service. The Contractor is responsible for receiving and unloading of delivered goods. Government employees will not receive materials or supplies for the Contractor and will not be responsible for damage to the Contractor's equipment or materials.
- **16. Omissions** This contract may not cover all specified activities, steps, and procedures required to supply the contract product. In case of omission, the normal industry, state, or federal standards, practices, specifications, and/or guides shall prevail. In no instance shall an omission be reason to produce less than an acceptable product.

Part 2 Equipment:

1. Condition of Equipment— All equipment used to perform work under this contract must be in good operating and mechanical condition and comply with EM 385-1-1, Army Corps of Engineers Safety and Health Requirements. A regular schedule of preventive maintenance must be followed on all equipment. All vehicles utilized under this contract will be presentable, serviceable, and shall comply with safety standards.

2. Type of Equipment-

- **a.** The Contractor shall provide the appropriate equipment and tools of the trade to execute the requirements of the Performance Work Statement.
- **b.** Types of equipment for this work may include but not be limited to:
 - i. Non-Motorized hand tools such as hand saws and loppers.
 - ii. Small, motorized hand tools such as chainsaws and brush cutters.
 - iii. Small to industrial sized chippers.
 - iv. Fixed tooth or flail style mower heads attached to appropriately sized equipment such as tracked excavators, skid steer machines, or tractors.
 - v. Cable, grapple, or winching equipment designed to move large trees.
 - vi. Other equipment related to vegetation removal as determined by the service requirements of this Performance Work Statement.

NOTE: Transportation and Fuel costs to and from the project location shall be included in the bid amount for each location and service.

NOTE: Use caution around power lines that may exist at work sites.

Part 3 Service Description:

1. Tree, Brush, and Shrub Removal:

- **a.** The Contractor shall remove trees of varying size from three (3) inches diameter at breast height (DBH) and above. This may include trees that have already fallen into the designated work areas.
- **b.** The Contractor shall also cut and remove the brush, shrubs, or small trees less than and including 3 inches in diameter. (Trees Diameter at breast height DBH; Brush and Shrubs Diameter at ground level).
- **c.** Trees shall be felled, all branches/limbs from said trees shall be chipped or removed, and the stumps shall be cut flush with the ground. All debris and logs from trees felled, shall be removed from Hopkinton Everett Lake property.
- **d.** The predominant trees species located in the designated work area include, but are not limited to, hardwood species such as Silver Maple and Red Maple which reach approximate heights of up to 60ft.
- **e.** All woody vegetation cut shall be removed from Hopkinton Everett Lakes property.
- f. Only woody vegetation 3" and under can be chipped at the work area (See #3. Wood Chipping below).
- **g.** All woody debris/vegetation that is currently downed or "piled" in the designated work area shall also be removed from Hopkinton Everett Lakes Property.

2. Hazard Tree Removal:

- **a.** The Contractor shall remove trees and parts of trees that have become a hazard (or the process of removing said trees will cause a hazard) to personnel, property, or infrastructure.
- **b.** The trees will range in size and are likely in a precarious position with the likelihood of placing property or infrastructure at risk during the removal.
- **c.** Whole or partial trees felled, shall have all branches/limbs from said trees chipped or removed and any stump shall be cut flush with the ground. Any log from said trees, shall be removed from Hopkinton Everett Lakes property.
- **d.** Some tree removals may require the use of specialized equipment due to the size and/or location of the tree.

3. Wood Chipping:

- **a.** The Contractor shall chip all brush, shrubs, trees, and tree limbs up to 3 inches DBH or remove that material from Hopkinton Everett Lakes property.
- **b.** Material over 3 inches in diameter must be taken off of Hopkinton Everett Lakes property so it does not compromise flood operations and cannot be chipped at the work area.
- **c.** No wood chip piles shall exceed six (6) inches in height or seventy-five (75) feet in diameter.
- **d.** Wood chips may not be broadcast into the water or into the rip rap slopes or canal floor.
- **e.** Trees and tree limbs not chipped must be taken offsite by the contractor unless directed otherwise by the TPOC.

Part 4 Service Requirements:

1. Hopkinton Dam Canal #1:

- a. Tree Removal: Cut and remove trees ranging in size from three (3) inches DBH and larger from within the designated work area. The work area is located on each side of Canal #1 and includes the areas where trees are growing in/on the rip rap floor of the canal and the rip rap slopes of the canal (approximately 1.3 acres in total). Trees or any debris from felling trees must be removed from Hopkinton Everett Lakes Project lands or chipped, unless otherwise directed by the TPOC.
 - i. The trees in the work area are predominantly Silver Maple and Red Maple species and are approximately 60 feet in height.
 - ii. There is some woody debris that is already downed and partially stacked in the work area that is required to be removed as well.
 - iii. Any wood chipping that occurs shall have the wood chips directed into the wood line and NOT on any rip rap surface or rip rap slope.
- **b.** Aerial photos maps of the work area are shown in **Exhibits A C**.
- c. Photographs of the designated work area are shown in Exhibits D I.

Part 5 Service Locations:

1. ITEM NO. 1 – Hopkinton Dam Canal #1

- **a.** Access: The downstream work site can be accessed from the Hopkinton Everett Lake Project Office Park access road. The upstream worksite can be accessed from an access trail through the woods nearest and agricultural field on the south side of the canal. These fields are accessed via a roadway access near Route 202/9 which has a locked gate. The Contractor shall coordinate with the TPOC to gain access and entry to each side of the canal.
- **b. Site Information:** The flat portion of the canal is composed of rip rap rock protection of varying size and placement along the distance from the entry area to the work area. This can make travel for equipment and machinery that is not outfitted with larger tires or tracks. During normal water levels, the channel containing the water as shown in the photos is between the two flat rip rap areas. In the photos the edges of the flat rip rap "floor" areas can be seen where the brush is growing near the edges of the water. This water channel changes in depth from approximately 1 to 2 feet deep near the access points to the canal and up to approximately 8 to 10 feet deep at the area where it meets the Contoocook River.
- c. The access points and work area are shown in Exhibits A C.



Note: Executive Order (EO) 13706, Establishing Paid Sick Leave for Federal Contractors, applies to all contracts subject to the Service Contract Act for which the contract is awarded (and any solicitation was issued) on or after January 1, 2017. If this contract is covered by the EO, the contractor must provide employees with 1 hour of paid sick leave for every 30 hours they work, up to 56 hours of paid sick leave each year. Employees must be permitted to use paid sick leave for their own illness, injury or other health-related needs, including preventive care; to assist a family member (or person who is like family to the employee) who is ill, injured, or has other health-related needs, including preventive care; or for reasons resulting from, or to assist a family member (or person who is like family to the employee) who is the victim of, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking. Additional information on contractor requirements and worker protections under the EO is available at www.dol.gov/whd/govcontracts.

ALL OCCUPATIONS LISTED ABOVE RECEIVE THE FOLLOWING BENEFITS:

HEALTH & WELFARE: \$4.98 per hour, up to 40 hours per week, or \$199.20 per week or \$863.20 per month

HEALTH & WELFARE EO 13706: \$4.57 per hour, up to 40 hours per week, or \$182.80 per week, or \$792.13 per month*

*This rate is to be used only when compensating employees for performance on an SCA-covered contract also covered by EO 13706, Establishing Paid Sick Leave for Federal Contractors. A contractor may not receive credit toward its SCA obligations for any paid sick leave provided pursuant to EO 13706.

VACATION: 1 week paid vacation after 1 year of service with a contractor or successor; 2 weeks after 2 years; and 3 weeks after 10 years. Length of service includes the whole span of continuous service with the present contractor or successor, wherever employed, and with the predecessor contractors in the performance of similar work at the same Federal facility. (Reg. 29 CFR 4.173)

HOLIDAYS: A minimum of eleven paid holidays per year: New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr.'s Birthday, Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Juneteenth National Independence Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Columbus Day, Veterans' Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day. (A contractor may substitute for any of the named holidays another day off with pay in accordance with a plan communicated to the employees involved.) (See 29 CFR 4.174)

THE OCCUPATIONS WHICH HAVE NUMBERED FOOTNOTES IN PARENTHESES RECEIVE THE FOLLOWING:

1) COMPUTER EMPLOYEES: This wage determination does not apply to any individual employed in a bona fide executive, administrative, or professional capacity, as defined in 29 C.F.R. Part 541. (See 41 C.F.R. 6701(3)). Because most Computer Systems Analysts and Computer Programmers who are paid at least \$27.63 per hour (or at least \$684 per week if paid on a salary or fee basis) likely qualify as exempt computer professionals under 29 U.S.C. 213(a)(1) and 29 U.S.C. 213(a)(17), this wage determination may not include wage rates for all occupations within those job families. In such instances, a conformance will be necessary if there are nonexempt employees in these job families working on the contract.

Job titles vary widely and change quickly in the computer industry, and are not determinative of whether an employee is an exempt computer professional. To be exempt, computer employees who satisfy the compensation requirements must also have a primary duty that consists of:

- (1) The application of systems analysis techniques and procedures, including consulting with users, to determine hardware, software or system functional specifications;
- (2) The design, development, documentation, analysis, creation, testing or modification of computer systems or programs, including prototypes, based on and related to user or system design specifications;
- (3) The design, documentation, testing, creation or modification of computer programs related to machine operating systems; or
- (4) A combination of the aforementioned duties, the performance of which requires the same level of skills. (29 C.F.R. 541.400).

Any computer employee who meets the applicable compensation requirements and the above duties test qualifies as an exempt computer professional under both section 13(a)(1) and section 13(a)(17) of the Fair Labor Standards Act. (Field Assistance Bulletin No. 2006-3 (Dec. 14, 2006)). Accordingly, this wage determination will not apply to any exempt computer employee regardless of which of these two exemptions is utilized.

2) AIR TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS AND WEATHER OBSERVERS - NIGHT PAY & SUNDAY PAY: If you

work at night as part of a regular tour of duty, you will earn a night differential and receive an additional 10% of basic pay for any hours worked between 6pm and 6am. If you are a full-time employed (40 hours a week) and Sunday is part of your regularly scheduled workweek, you are paid at your rate of basic pay plus a Sunday premium of 25% of your basic rate for each hour of Sunday work which is not overtime (i.e. occasional work on Sunday outside the normal tour of duty is considered overtime work).

** HAZARDOUS PAY DIFFERENTIAL **

An 8 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a high degree of hazard when working with or in close proximity to ordnance, explosives, and incendiary materials. This includes work such as screening, blending, dying, mixing, and pressing of sensitive ordnance, explosives, and pyrotechnic compositions such as lead azide, black powder and photoflash powder. All dry-house activities involving propellants or explosives. Demilitarization, modification, renovation, demolition, and maintenance operations on sensitive ordnance, explosives and incendiary materials. All operations involving re-grading and cleaning of artillery ranges.

A 4 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a low degree of hazard when working with, or in close proximity to ordnance, (or employees possibly adjacent to) explosives and incendiary materials which involves potential injury such as laceration of hands, face, or arms of the employee engaged in the operation, irritation of the skin, minor burns and the like; minimal damage to immediate or adjacent work area or equipment being used. All operations involving, unloading, storage, and hauling of ordnance, explosive, and incendiary ordnance material other than small arms ammunition. These differentials are only applicable to work that has been specifically designated by the agency for ordnance, explosives, and incendiary material differential pay.

** UNIFORM ALLOWANCE **

If employees are required to wear uniforms in the performance of this contract (either by the terms of the Government contract, by the employer, by the state or local law, etc.), the cost of furnishing such uniforms and maintaining (by laundering or dry cleaning) such uniforms is an expense that may not be borne by an employee where such cost reduces the hourly rate below that required by the wage determination. The Department of Labor will accept payment in accordance with the following standards as compliance:

The contractor or subcontractor is required to furnish all employees with an adequate number of uniforms without cost or to reimburse employees for the actual cost of the uniforms. In addition, where uniform cleaning and maintenance is made the responsibility of the employee, all contractors and subcontractors subject to this wage determination shall (in the absence of a bona fide collective bargaining agreement providing for a different amount, or the furnishing of contrary affirmative proof as to the actual cost), reimburse all employees for such cleaning and maintenance at a rate of \$3.35 per week (or \$.67 cents per day). However, in

those instances where the uniforms furnished are made of ""wash and wear"" materials, may be routinely washed and dried with other personal garments, and do not require any special treatment such as dry cleaning, daily washing, or commercial laundering in order to meet the cleanliness or appearance standards set by the terms of the Government contract, by the contractor, by law, or by the nature of the work, there is no requirement that employees be reimbursed for uniform maintenance costs.

** SERVICE CONTRACT ACT DIRECTORY OF OCCUPATIONS **

The duties of employees under job titles listed are those described in the ""Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations"", Fifth Edition (Revision 1), dated September 2015, unless otherwise indicated.

** REQUEST FOR AUTHORIZATION OF ADDITIONAL CLASSIFICATION AND WAGE RATE, Standard
Form 1444 (SF-1444) **

Conformance Process:

The contracting officer shall require that any class of service employee which is not listed herein and which is to be employed under the contract (i.e., the work to be performed is not performed by any classification listed in the wage determination), be classified by the contractor so as to provide a reasonable relationship (i.e., appropriate level of skill comparison) between such unlisted classifications and the classifications listed in the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(i)). Such conforming procedures shall be initiated by the contractor prior to the performance of contract work by such unlisted class(es) of employees (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(ii)). The Wage and Hour Division shall make a final determination of conformed classification, wage rate, and/or fringe benefits which shall be paid to all employees performing in the classification from the first day of work on which contract work is performed by them in the classification. Failure to pay such unlisted employees the compensation agreed upon by the interested parties and/or fully determined by the Wage and Hour Division retroactive to the date such class of employees commenced contract work shall be a violation of the Act and this contract. (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(v)). When multiple wage determinations are included in a contract, a separate SF-1444 should be prepared for each wage determination to which a class(es) is to be conformed.

The process for preparing a conformance request is as follows:

- 1) When preparing the bid, the contractor identifies the need for a conformed occupation(s) and computes a proposed rate(s).
- 2) After contract award, the contractor prepares a written report listing in order the proposed classification title(s), a Federal grade equivalency (FGE) for each proposed classification(s), job description(s), and rationale for proposed wage rate(s), including information regarding the agreement or disagreement of the authorized representative of the employees involved, or where there is no authorized representative, the employees themselves. This report should be submitted to the contracting officer no later than 30 days after such unlisted class(es) of employees

performs any contract work.

- 3) The contracting officer reviews the proposed action and promptly submits a report of the action, together with the agency's recommendations and pertinent information including the position of the contractor and the employees, to the U.S. Department of Labor, Wage and Hour Division, for review (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(ii)).
- 4) Within 30 days of receipt, the Wage and Hour Division approves, modifies, or disapproves the action via transmittal to the agency contracting officer, or notifies the contracting officer that additional time will be required to process the request.
- 5) The contracting officer transmits the Wage and Hour Division's decision to the contractor.
- 6) Each affected employee shall be furnished by the contractor with a written copy of such determination or it shall be posted as a part of the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(iii)).

Information required by the Regulations must be submitted on SF-1444 or bond paper.

When preparing a conformance request, the ""Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations" should be used to compare job definitions to ensure that duties requested are not performed by a classification already listed in the wage determination. Remember, it is not the job title, but the required tasks that determine whether a class is included in an established wage determination. Conformances may not be used to artificially split, combine, or subdivide classifications listed in the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.152(c)(1)).
