I. GENERAL

1. Scope

Provide all equipment, materials, labor, and transportation necessary for the demolition, removal and replacement of the Goshen Radio Relay Station Main Access Gate. The existing access gate is a single-leaf steel gate with a holdback post. Work includes demolition and disposal of the existing access gate as well as provision and installation of new gate and holdback posts.

2. Location

The Goshen Relay Station is located at 493 Hageman-Shean Road Goshen, CT 06759

3. Technical Point of Contact

The Technical Point of Contact is Park Ranger David Grandy. The Technical Point of Contact can be reached by phone at 860-338-3561 or by email at: david.k.grandy@usace.army.mil

4. Site Visit

Contact the Technical Point of Contact to arrange a site visit. Site visits are generally held between 7:00 am and 3:30 pm Monday through Friday.

5. Schedule

The work shall be completed no later than 120 days after contract award. The project area will be open to the Contractor Monday through Friday 7:00 AM to 3:30 PM and all work must be done during those hours unless additional hours are approved by the Technical Point of Contact. No work shall be done on weekends or Government holidays unless approved in advance by the Technical Point of Contact. Please note that the project may be subject to flooding as well as heightened security measures, which may require work to be re-scheduled. At least twenty-four (24) hours' notice will be provided to the Contractor by the Technical Point of Contact in these instances.

All preconstruction submittals shall be submitted within 21 days of Contract Award. The Government reserves up to 21 days for review and acceptance on each submittal/ resubmittal from the date of receipt. If revisions are necessary to the submittals, the Contractor shall make such revisions and shall be resubmitted to the Government in an acceptable form within 14 days of the Government's response, unless additional time is granted by the Government in writing. No field work may proceed prior to the acceptance of preconstruction submittals.

6. Safety Requirements

** USACE staff reserve the right to cease work at any time should the safety of Employees, Contractors, and/or the Public become jeopardized. **

a. General:

All work shall be conducted in accordance with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Safety and Occupational Health Requirements (EM 385-1-1, most recent edition), and all applicable Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), federal, state, and local safety and health requirements. A copy of EM 385-1-1 can be accessed electronically at the following link: https://www.publications.usace.army.mil/Portals/76/EM%20385-1-1%20_EFFECTIVE%2015March2024.pdf

b. Accident Prevention Plan (APP):

The Contractor shall prepare a site-specific Accident Prevention Plan. The APP must be written by a Competent Person (CP) and document the specific work processes, equipment, materials to be used, hazards and applicable control measures.

The mandatory ENG Form 6293 (Accident Prevention Plan Worksheet) must be submitted and accepted prior to beginning on site work: https://www.publications.usace.army.mil/Portals/76/Eng_Form_6293_2023Aug31.pdf

A preparatory meeting shall be conducted by the Prime Contractor to discuss the APP contents with all effected onsite employees. The Prime Contractor is responsible for informing the subcontractors of the safety provisions under the terms of the contract, the penalties for noncompliance, and inspecting subcontractor operations to ensure that accident prevention responsibilities are being carried out.

Daily safety meetings shall be held and documented. Records shall be available to the Technical Point of Contact upon request.

c. Activity Hazard Analysis (AHA):

An AHA shall be submitted and accepted for each definable feature of work (DFOW) in accordance with EM 385-1-1, Chapter 2-6. A DFOW is defined as any task, which is separate and distinct from other tasks, has separate control requirements, or is identified as different trades or disciplines. The AHA shall be continuously reviewed and revised to address changing site conditions as appropriate.

d. Site Safety and Health Officer (SSHO) Requirements:

The Contractor shall employ a minimum of one person to function as a Level 3, SSHO. A Level 3 SSHO is a designated Qualified Person (QP) or Competent Person (CP) with Safety and Occupational Health (SOH) responsibility that meets the requirements of EM 385-1-1, Chapter 2-3.b and 2-4. b

Level 3 SSHOs must have training, knowledge, and/or experience identifying hazards and implementing controls for the work being performed.

The SSHO shall be present at the project site and be responsible for overseeing the implementation of the Prime Contractor's SOH program. Contractor shall designate all SSHOs on a mandatory ENG Form 6282 (Site Safety and Health Officer Designation Letter): https://www.publications.usace.army.mil/Portals/76/Eng_Form_6282_2023Aug28.pdf

e. First-Aid and CPR Personnel Requirements:

For shifts with multiple employees, provide at least two employees that are certified to administer First Aid and CPR. When employees work alone, they must be certified in First Aid and be provided an effective means of communication to call for assistance in the event of an emergency. Minimum First Aid and CPR qualifications are outlined in EM 385-1-1, Chapter 3-3.

f. Additional Personnel Requirements:

Other Competent Person (CP) or Qualified Persons (QP) may be required per EM 385-1-1 and/or other sections of this Scope of Work, based on the definable features of work for this project.

g. Accident Reporting:

All accidents and near misses shall be investigated by the Contractor and reported to the Technical Point of Contact in accordance with EM 385-1-1, Table 2-1.

The mandatory ENG Form 3394 shall be completed and submitted to the Technical Point of Contact within seven (7) days of an incident: https://www.publications.usace.army.mil/Portals/76/Publications/EngineerForms/Eng_Form_3394_2021Aug.pdf

h. Employee Exposure Data:

The Contractor shall electronically report total employee work hours (including subcontractors) to the Technical Point of Contact by close of business on the 10th calendar day of the following month.

- i. Excavation and Trenching
- i. General: All excavating and trenching activities are required to be completed in accordance with EM 385-1-1, Chapter 25.

ii. Submittals:

- 1. Activity Hazard Analysis (AHA) is required to be developed by a Competent Person (CP) for all work in excavations and trenches.
- 2. For excavations or trenches 5 feet (1.5m) or more in depth, an Excavation and Trenching Plan is required. The plan must be developed by a Competent Person, submitted, and approved by the USACE supervisor or accepted by the Technical Point of Contact prior to beginning work. The plan must meet minimum plan requirements outlined in EM 385-1-1, Chapter 25-7.

iii. Required Personnel:

- 1. Competent Person (CP): All projects that involve excavation and trenching activities are required to have a Competent Person (CP) who has training, knowledge, and experience in excavation and trenching soil analysis, use of protective systems, and the requirements of EM 385-1-1 Chapter 12 and 29 CFR 1926 Subpart P.
- 2. Rescue Personnel: Must be trained on rescue procedures identified in Excavation and Trenching Plan.

7. Pre-Construction Conference

Prior to the start of any work, the Technical Point of Contact will schedule and conduct a "Pre-Construction Conference". The Contractor's Project Manager and Quality Control Personnel shall be physically present at this meeting. The Contractor shall directly oversee all work on the project and the Project Manager and Quality Control Personnel shall have the authority to act on behalf of the Contractor. This conference will be held at the time and location agreeable to the Government and Contractor. No work may be performed under this contract prior to this conference. The purpose of the conference is to enable the Technical Point of Contact to outline the procedures that will be followed by the Government in its administration of the contract, and to discuss the performance that will be expected from the Contractor. This conference will allow the Contractor an opportunity to ask questions about the Government's administration and inspection of contract work or obtain other pertinent information that might be required. At the Pre-Construction Conference the Contractor shall provide the name of the Project Superintendent with a telephone number for project coordination.

The following is a general list of items for discussion during this Pre-Construction Conference:

- a. Authority of the Technical Point of Contact and Quality Assurance Inspectors
- b. Mandatory ENG Form 6293 (Accident Prevention Plan Worksheet) and Activity Hazard Analysis for each Definable Feature of Work (DFOW)
- c. Contractor's Safety Program (including sub-contractors)
- d. Safety Meetings & Documentation
- e. Safety Data Sheet (SDS) requirements
- f. Correspondence, Communication and Administrative
- g. Procedures ENG Form 3394 (Mandatory if needed for Accident Reporting)
- h. Invoice and Payment

8. Permits

The Contractor shall, without additional expense to the Government, be responsible for obtaining any necessary licenses, permits, and letters of certification. The Contractor shall comply with any applicable Federal, State, County, and Municipal laws, codes, and regulations in connection with the performance of the work specified under this contract.

9. Security

The Contractor will comply with all established security policies at all locations. Due to periods of heightened security that may affect the access to the areas covered under this contract, areas may be subject to closures, which in turn may reduce or inhibit the Contractor's ability to access certain areas. During periods of heightened security, the Government reserves the right, at any time, to close any property or portion of property and reschedule and/or cancel any subsequent work in an area. The Contractor shall be given at least 24-hour notice of any such closure.

10. Contractor's Personnel

a. Minimum Personnel Requirements - The Contractor shall provide an adequate number of fully qualified personnel to perform the specified work properly and efficiently within the time limits specified. The Contractor shall provide a list of the names and contact phone numbers for all employees prior to them working on Government Property.

b. Employee Conduct - The Contractor shall be responsible for seeing that the firm's employees strictly comply with all CFR 36 Rules and Regulations, federal, state, and municipal laws. Any personnel activity, which, in the opinion of the Government, is deemed detrimental to the performance of the contract may result in the removal of Contractor employee/employees.

Examples of unbecoming actions or conduct include but are not limited to the following:

- i. Cursing, harassment, or discrimination of and/or unwarranted physical contact with visitors, USACE personnel, or other contractors
- ii. Recurring written and/or verbal complaints from visitors, USACE personnel, or other contractors.
- iii. Unsafe operation of vehicles while on USACE property.
- c. Removal of Contractor's Employees The Technical Point of Contact may require the Contractor to immediately remove from the work site any employee of the Contractor or subcontractor, who, in the opinion of the Technical Point of Contact, is incompetent, who endangers persons or property, or whose physical or mental condition is such that it would impair the employee's ability to satisfactorily perform assigned work. Notification to the Contractor shall be promptly made in writing if time and circumstances permit. Otherwise, notification shall be verbal or by telephone, and shall be confirmed in writing as soon as possible. No such removal, however, will reduce the Contractor's obligation to perform all work required under this contract, and immediate replacement will be made as required. This requirement shall not be made the basis of any claim for compensation or damages against the United States or any of its officers or agents.

11. Payment

After final inspection and acceptance by the Government, the Contractor must submit an invoice to the Technical Point of Contact. The invoice shall include the invoice date, contract number, dates of work, description of work, quantities, process, and total amount due per line item. The invoice must also include the company letterhead, and this must match the data that is registered in the System for Award Management (SAM) registry. For jobs greater than 30 days the Contractor may request multiple payments.

II. TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS

1. Summary

Provide all equipment, materials, labor, and transportation necessary for the demolition, removal and replacement of the Goshen Radio Relay Station Main Access Gate. The new Main Access Gate shall be installed approximately five feet (5') inside where the existing gate is located. Final gate position to be approved by the Technical Point of Contact prior to start of work. All steel gate material removed shall be recycled as scrap at an appropriate recycling facility.

- a. The Goshen Radio Relay Station Main Access Gate shall span a minimum of fourteen feet (14') from post to post, with a height of four feet (4') unless otherwise approved by Technical Point of Contact.
- b. The new Goshen Radio Relay Station Main Access Gate shall have a single gate leaf. (See Informational Photos 1, 2 and 6).
- c. The new Goshen Radio Relay Station Main Access Gate shall be installed approximately five feet (5') inside where the existing gate is located. d. To eliminate security concerns, the Contractor will remove old Goshen Radio Relay Station Main Access Gate components after installation of new gate is complete to the satisfaction of the Technical Point of Contact. Contractor is responsible for removal, demolition and proper disposal of old
- Goshen Radio Relay Station Main Access Gate and footing components.
- e. All work shall be executed when overnight temperatures average above thirty-two degrees Fahrenheit (32oF).
- f. Any open holes left because of demolition will be backfilled by the Contractor to the satisfaction of the Technical Point of Contact. Backfill material will include at least six inches (6") of screened topsoil.

2. Existing Conditions

- a. The Goshen Relay Station currently has a single leaf steel Main Access Gate, measuring thirteen feet and nine inches (13'9") wide. No hold back posts are currently installed. (See Informational Photos 3, 4 and 5).
- b. This is a remote site. therefore, no water or restroom facilities are available.

3. Submittals

Although the Government reviews submissions required by this Statement of Work, it is emphasized that the Contractor's work must be completed using proper internal controls and review procedures. The Government reserves up to twenty-one (21) days for review and acceptance on each submittal/resubmittal from the date of receipt. If revisions are necessary to the submittals, the Contractor shall make such revisions and shall resubmit to the Government in an acceptable form within fourteen (14) days of the Government's response, unless additional time is granted by the Government in writing.

The documents identified below must be prepared in accordance with the applicable standards, submitted to the Technical Point of Contact for review

and must be accepted by the Government.

Pre-Construction Submittals: Submitted within twenty-one (21) days of Contract Award. Submittals must be accepted prior to the commencement of any field work.

- a. ENG Form 6293 (Mandatory Accident Prevention Plan Worksheet)
- b. Activity Hazard Analysis; non-mandatory template available: ENG Form 6206
- c. ENG Form 6282 (Site Safety and Health Officer Designation Letter)

- f. Safety Data Sheet (SDS) for applicable materials
- g. Safety Inspection for all Heavy Equipment: The Contractor shall submit a current written safety inspection for all heavy equipment proposed for use on this contract.
- h. Work Site Plan: Prior to the start of on-site work, the Contractor shall submit a site plan.

4. Clean Up and Waste Disposal

The Contractor shall practice good housekeeping to maintain a safe job site. The Contractor shall keep the work area, including any designated storage areas free from accumulation of waste materials. Upon completing work in an area, the Contractor shall remove any tools, equipment, and materials that are not the property of the Government. Any and all disturbed areas resulting from Contractor activities shall be restored by the Contractor to the satisfaction of the Technical Point of Contact. All waste material will be disposed of offsite in accordance with all federal, state, and local regulations.

5. Environmental Protection

Containers for excess and/ or waste materials shall be provided by the Contractor at the site, and the site will be inspected and cleaned on a daily basis when working onsite. Water, air, and land resources shall not be adversely impacted during the course of the work. The Contractor will take necessary steps to ensure all Federal, State, and Local environmental regulatory requirements are met at no additional cost to the Government. Assurance of compliance with this section by subcontractors shall be the responsibility of the Contractor. No burning is permissible. Contractor may be required to submit an Environmental Protection Plan, if requested by the Technical Point of Contact.

6. Sustainability & Environmentally Preferred Products:

Under the Comprehensive Procurement Guidelines (CPG) program, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) designates products that are or can be made with recovered materials and recommends practices for buying these products. Any designated product that is being offered or supplied under this contract shall meet the minimum recommended content levels as identified under the CPG program. Offerors must be able to demonstrate that each offered products meets minimum content levels upon request.

7. Personal Protective Equipment

It is the Contractor's responsibility to furnish and supply personnel with the proper personal protective equipment necessary for performing the work.

8. Government Resources

The Contractor shall supply his own means of communication (telephone). There is not a restroom available at the contract site, and there is no access to potable water at the contract site. In addition, no electricity is on site. The Contractor would have to provide these resources or have an acceptable alternative plan for these resources.

9. Damage to Government and Private Property

The Contractor shall be responsible for restoring any Government facilities or structures damaged because of the Contractor's actions. The Contractor shall also be responsible for any damage to private property or injury to any person because of the firm's operations. The Contractor shall notify the Technical Point of Contact immediately of damage to Government and private property and injury to any person resulting from the Contractors' operation. Also, the Contractor shall notify the Technical Point of Contact of damage to Government facilities due to vandalism or other causes on the day such damage is first noticed. Trucks and/or trailers will be driven on existing roads only and not across or through park areas to facilities. The Contractor shall also restore landscape features (shrubs, flowers, grasses, etc.), which are damaged or destroyed by the firm's operation. Damaged or destroyed grass areas shall be re-planted as directed by the Technical Point of Contact, and shrubs and flowers which are damaged or destroyed shall be replaced from nursery stock of like size and kind.

10. Omissions

This contract may not cover all specified activities, steps, and procedures required to supply the contract product. In case of omission, the normal industry, state, or federal standards, practices, specifications, and/or guides shall prevail. In no instance shall an omission be reason to produce less than an acceptable product.

11. Quality Assurance

The Contractor is responsible for the quality control of the contract work. The Contractor shall establish and maintain a quality control system to assure compliance with the contract requirements. The Government has the right to inspect and test all items called for by the contract, to the extent practicable at all times and at all places during the term of the contract.

12. Other Contracts

The Government may undertake or award other contracts for additional work not related to this contract, and the Contractor shall fully cooperate with other contractors and Government employees. The Contractor shall not commit or permit any act which will interfere with the performance of work by another contractor or by Government employees.

13. Receiving and Storing Materials

The Contractor is responsible for protecting any stored material until it is placed in service. The Contractor is responsible for receiving and unloading of delivered goods. Government employees will not receive materials or supplies for the Contractor and will not be responsible for damage to the

Contractor's equipment or materials.

14. Requests for information

15. Condition of Equipment

All equipment used to perform work under this contract must be in good operating and mechanical condition and comply with EM 385-1-1, Army Corps of Engineers Safety and Health Requirements. A regular schedule of preventive maintenance must be followed on all equipment. All vehicles utilized under this contract will be presentable, serviceable, and shall comply with manufacturer's safety features in place.

16. Equipment Storage

No Government space or storage facilities shall be provided under this contract.

III. Execution

1. Install New Gate

a. The gate design is required to be approved by the Government prior to fabrication. Any changes to proposed gate dimensions will be approved by the Technical Point of Contact before fabrication.

b. Goshen Main Access Gate:

The new fabricated gate will be constructed using four-inch (4") steel schedule forty (40) pipe and will contain a minimum of at least fifty percent (50%) post-consumer recycled content. Both pre- and post-consumer content documentation will be required and approved by the Government, prior to fabrication.

- i. All gate arms and holdback posts will have a concrete footing to prevent posts from coming out of alignment. (See Informational Photos 1-3)
- ii. The Goshen Main Access Gate shall span a minimum of fourteen feet (14') from post to post, with a height of four feet (4') unless otherwise approved by Technical Point of Contact. The Goshen Main Access Gate shall have a single gate leaf. (See Informational Photos 1, 2 and 6). iii. The new Goshen Main Access gate shall be installed approximately five feet (5') inside the existing gate. Final location to be approved by Technical Point of Contact prior to start of work.
- iv. The new fabricated gate will be made of four-inch (4") steel schedule forty (40) pipe and will contain a minimum of at least fifty percent (50%) post-consumer recycled content. Both pre- and post-consumer content documentation will be required and approved by the Government, prior to fabrication.

c. Holdback posts

- i. Goshen Main Access gate shall have two (2) holdback posts. One (1) post will secure the gate in the open position, and one (1) post will secure the gate in the closed position. (See Informational Photos 1, 2 and 6)
- ii. The gate will be designed to be secured to an appropriately sized and positioned holdback post with an appropriate pin on which a Government provided padlock can be secured.
- iii. The Contractor will provide and install appropriate holdback post for all gates to secure them in both the open and closed positions.
- iv. When in the closed position, the gate will have a locking mechanism that can be secured with a padlock.

d. Alignment

- i. The gate should swing into the locking positions without a need to physically raise or lower the gate leaf by the operator. Each lock box will have, at minimum, a two inch by two inch (2" x 2") cutout in them to allow for inspection and operation.
- ii. Gate posts shall be plumb, and arms shall be level throughout the gate swing.
- iii. Each gate leaf must have at least two (2) adjustment mechanisms to compensate for gate sagging over time. (See Informational Photo 3)
- e. Grease Fittings (aka "Zerk fittings" or grease nipples)
- i. Grease fittings will be 1/4-28 straight standard fittings.
- ii. Grease fittings will be positioned so that they are on the outside portion of the gate and can be accessed for use without any disassembly of the gate. Enough fittings will be installed to ensure adequate lubrication of the gate.
- iii. The Contractor will adequately grease the gate upon installation with a multi-purpose grease.

f. Paint

- i. Gate shall be painted and allowed to dry in accordance with paint manufacturer's recommendations prior to installation activities.
- ii. All metal surfaces shall be cleaned and prepared in accordance with paint manufacturer's recommendations.
- iii. All gate surfaces shall receive a minimum of one coat of rust-inhibiting metal primer so that all surfaces are adequately and evenly covered, and no runs or sagging exists.
- iv. All gate surfaces shall receive a minimum of two coats of safety yellow paint (color to be approved by the Technical Point of Contact). Paint will be applied so that all surfaces are adequately and evenly covered, and no runs or sagging exists.
- v. Both primer and paint will be intended for exterior metal application and long-term corrosion resistance.

g. Concrete/Anchors- (See informational photo 1-3)

- i. The concrete used to anchor both the gate post, as well as the locking will have a minimum two thousand, five-hundred pounds per square inch (2500 PSI) compressive strength at twenty-eight (28) days with maximum three-quarter inch (3/4") angular aggregate.
- ii. The entire concrete footing for all posts will extend at least forty-eight inches (48") below the surface to ensure it is anchored below the frost line. The footing will be wide enough to prevent gate "sagging" under normal use.
- iii. The top of the footing should be flush with the ground.
- iv. The concrete anchor shall be set in a concrete form tube with a minimum diameter of twenty-four inches (24") and a minimum forty-eight inches (48") in height. The concrete form tube shall be filled fully with concrete and the top of the finished anchor shall be flush with the ground.
- v. All voids around excavated areas shall be filled and thoroughly compacted to ensure anchors do not shift. Contract may reuse excavated material for fill.

- h. Miscellaneous
- i. Steel bolts, nuts, washers, and miscellaneous hardware will conform to the following requirements:
- 1. Steel bolts: ASTM A 307, Grade A
- 2. Steel nuts: AASHTO M 291
- 3. Steel washers ASTMF 884
- 4. Steel hardware will be galvanized after fabrication in accordance with AASHTO M 232.
- i. Gate Operation/Testing
- i. Upon completion, all gates shall swing easily between the open and closed positions, with gate arms aligning with each other and with lockboxes, and all holes and pins in alignment to the satisfaction of the Technical Point of Contact.
- 2. Demolish Existing Goshen Radio Relay Station Main Access Gate
- a. For Site Details, See Informational Photos 4-8.
- i. The existing, used gates entire structures must be safely demolished in accordance with federal, state, and local laws with the use of proper demolition equipment.
- ii. Any open holes left because of demolition will be backfilled by the Contractor to the satisfaction of the Technical Point of Contact.
- iii. Final six inches (6") of backfill material will be screened topsoil.
- b. Backfill:
- i. Any open holes left because of installation or demolition activities will be backfilled and compacted by the Contractor to the satisfaction of the Technical Point of Contact.
- ii. Contractor will fill with similar material to existing conditions. Contractor may reuse excavated material for fill. Any additional fill required will be the responsibility of the Contractor and shall be furnished at no additional cost to the Government.
- iii. Holes filled with earthen material will be comprised of a topmost layer of no less than six inches (6") of screened topsoil.
- c. All debris and waste must be disposed of and recycled in accordance with state, federal and local law.

Buy American-Construction Materials (Oct 2022)

(a) Definitions. As used in this clause-

Commercially available off-the-shelf (COTS) item-

- (1) Means any item of supply (including construction material) that is-
- (i) A commercial product (as defined in paragraph (1) of the definition of "commercial product" at Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) 2.101);
- (ii) Sold in substantial quantities in the commercial marketplace; and
- (iii) Offered to the Government, under a contract or subcontract at any tier, without modification, in the same form in which it is sold in the commercial marketplace; and
- (2) Does not include bulk cargo, as defined in 46 U.S.C. 40102(4), such as agricultural products and petroleum products.

"Construction material" means an article, material, or supply brought to the construction site by the Contractor or a subcontractor for incorporation into the building or work. The term also includes an item brought to the site preassembled from articles, materials, or supplies. However, emergency life safety systems, such as emergency lighting, fire alarm, and audio evacuation systems, that are discrete systems incorporated into a public building or work and that are produced as complete systems, are evaluated as a single and distinct construction material regardless of when or how the individual parts or components of those systems are delivered to the construction site. Materials purchased directly by the Government are supplies, not construction material.

Cost of components means-

- (1) For components purchased by the Contractor, the acquisition cost, including transportation costs to the place of incorporation into the construction material (whether or not such costs are paid to a domestic firm), and any applicable duty (whether or not a duty-free entry certificate is issued); or
- (2) For components manufactured by the Contractor, all costs associated with the manufacture of the component, including transportation costs as described in paragraph (1) of this definition, plus allocable overhead costs, but excluding profit. Cost of components does not include any costs associated with the manufacture of the construction material.

Critical component means a component that is mined, produced, or manufactured in the United States and deemed critical to the U.S. supply chain. The list of critical components is at FAR 25.105.

Critical item means a domestic construction material or domestic end product that is deemed critical to U.S. supply chain resiliency. The list of critical items is at FAR 25.105.

Domestic construction material means-

- (1) For construction material that does not consist wholly or predominantly of iron or steel or a combination of both-
- (i) An unmanufactured construction material mined or produced in the United States; or
- (ii) A construction material manufactured in the United States, if-
- (A) The cost of its components mined, produced, or manufactured in the United States exceeds 60 percent of the cost of all its components, except that the percentage will be 65 percent for items delivered in calendar years 2024 through 2028 and 75 percent for items delivered starting in calendar year 2029. Components of foreign origin of the same class or kind for which nonavailability determinations have been made are treated as domestic. Components of unknown origin are treated as foreign; or
- (B) The construction material is a COTS item; or
- (2) For construction material that consists wholly or predominantly of iron or steel or a combination of both, a construction material manufactured in the United States if the cost of foreign iron and steel constitutes less than 5 percent of the cost of all components used in such construction material. The cost of foreign iron and steel includes but is not limited to the cost of foreign iron or steel mill products (such as bar, billet, slab, wire, plate, or sheet), castings, or forgings utilized in the manufacture of the construction material and a good faith estimate of the cost of all foreign iron or steel components excluding COTS fasteners. Iron or steel components of unknown origin are treated as foreign. If the construction material contains multiple components, the cost of all the materials used in such construction material is calculated in accordance with the definition of "cost of components".

Fastener means a hardware device that mechanically joins or affixes two or more objects together. Examples of fasteners are nuts, bolts, pins, rivets, nails, clips, and screws.

Foreign construction material means a construction material other than a domestic construction material.

Foreign iron and steel means iron or steel products not produced in the United States. Produced in the United States means that all manufacturing processes of the iron or steel must take place in the United States, from the initial melting stage through the application of coatings, except metallurgical processes involving refinement of steel additives. The origin of the elements of the iron or steel is not relevant to the determination of whether it is domestic or foreign.

Predominantly of iron or steel or a combination of both means that the cost of the iron and steel content exceeds 50 percent of the total cost of all its components. The cost of iron and steel is the cost of the iron or steel mill products (such as bar, billet, slab, wire, plate, or sheet), castings, or forgings utilized in the manufacture of the product and a good faith estimate of the cost of iron or steel components excluding COTS fasteners.

Steel means an alloy that includes at least 50 percent iron, between 0.02 and 2 percent carbon, and may include other elements.

"United States" means the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and outlying areas.

- (b) Domestic preference.
- (1) This clause implements 41 U.S.C.chapter 83, Buy American, by providing a preference for domestic construction material. In accordance with 41 U.S.C. 1907, the domestic content test of the Buy American statute is waived for construction material that is a COTS item, except that for construction material that consists wholly or predominantly of iron or steel or a combination of both, the domestic content test is applied only to the iron and steel content of the construction materials, excluding COTS fasteners. (See FAR 12.505(a)(2)). The Contractor shall use only domestic construction material in performing this contract, except as provided in paragraphs (b)(2) and (b)(3) of this clause.
- (2) This requirement does not apply to information technology that is a commercial product or to the construction materials or components listed by the Government as follows:

- (3) The Contracting Officer may add other foreign construction material to the list in paragraph (b)(2) of this clause if the Government determines that-
- (i) The cost of domestic construction material would be unreasonable.
- (A) For domestic construction material that is not a critical item or does not contain critical components.
- (1) The cost of a particular domestic construction material subject to the requirements of the Buy American statute is unreasonable when the cost of such material exceeds the cost of foreign material by more than 20 percent;
- (2) For construction material that is not a COTS item and does not consist wholly or predominantly of iron or steel or a combination of both, if the cost of a particular domestic construction material is determined to be unreasonable or there is no domestic offer received, and the low offer is for foreign construction material that is manufactured in the United States and does not exceed 55 percent domestic content, the Contracting Officer will treat the lowest offer of foreign construction material that exceeds 55 percent domestic content as a domestic offer and determine whether the cost of that offer is unreasonable by applying the evaluation factor listed in paragraph (b)(3)(i)(A)(1) of this clause.
- (3) The procedures in paragraph (b)(3)(i)(A)(2) of this clause will no longer apply as of January 1, 2030.
- (B) For domestic construction material that is a critical item or contains critical components.
- (1) The cost of a particular domestic construction material that is a critical item or contains critical components, subject to the requirements of the Buy American statute, is unreasonable when the cost of such material exceeds the cost of foreign material by more than 20 percent plus the additional preference factor identified for the critical item or construction material containing critical components listed at FAR 25.105.
- (2) For construction material that does not consist wholly or predominantly of iron or steel or a combination of both, if the cost of a particular domestic construction material is determined to be unreasonable or there is no domestic offer received, and the low offer is for foreign construction material that does not exceed 55 percent domestic content, the Contracting Officer will treat the lowest foreign offer of construction material that is manufactured in the United States and exceeds 55 percent domestic content as a domestic offer, and determine whether the cost of that offer is unreasonable by applying the evaluation factor listed in paragraph (b)(3)(i)(B)(1) of this clause.
- (3) The procedures in paragraph (b)(3)(i)(B)(2) of this clause will no longer apply as of January 1, 2030.
- (ii) The application of the restriction of the Buy American statute to a particular construction material would be impracticable or inconsistent with the public interest; or
- (iii) The construction material is not mined, produced, or manufactured in the United States in sufficient and reasonably available commercial quantities of a satisfactory quality.

- (2) In the preparation of estimates, the Contracting Officer may authorize material delivered on the site and preparatory work done to be taken into consideration. Material delivered to the Contractor at locations other than the site also may be taken into consideration if-
- (i) Consideration is specifically authorized by this contract; and
- (ii) The Contractor furnishes satisfactory evidence that it has acquired title to such material and that the material will be used to perform this contract.
- (c) Contractor certification. Along with each request for progress payments, the Contractor shall furnish the following certification, or payment shall not be made: (However, if the Contractor elects to delete paragraph (c)(4) from the certification, the certification is still acceptable.)

(1) Notify the Contracting Officer of such performance deficiency; and
(2) Be obligated to pay the Government an amount (computed by the Contracting Officer in the manner provided in paragraph (j) of this clause) equal to interest on the unearned amount from the 8 thday after the date of receipt of the unearned amount until-
(i) The date the Contractor notifies the Contracting Officer that the performance deficiency has been corrected; or

When the work is substantially complete, the Contracting Officer may retain from previously withheld funds and future progress payments that amount the Contracting Officer considers adequate for protection of the Government and shall release to the Contractor all the remaining withheld funds. Also, on completion and acceptance of each separate building, public work, or other division of the contract, for which the price is stated separately in the contract, payment shall be made for the completed work without retention of a percentage.
(f) Title, liability, and reservation of rights. All material and work covered by progress payments made shall, at the time of payment, become the sole property of the Government, but this shall not be construed as-
