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SECURITY REQUIREMENTS

PERFORMANCE WORK STATEMENT

MECHANICAL VEGETATION REMOVAL U.S. ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS HOPKINTON-EVERETT LAKES CONTOOCOOK, NEW HAMPSHIRE Performance Work Statement

I. General:

- 1. Scope Furnish all labor, materials, and equipment necessary to perform mechanical vegetation removal at seven (7) locations around the Hopkinton-Everett Lakes Project totaling approximately 10.38 acres. See Exhibits A through G for work locations. This work shall include the cutting, removal, mulching or chipping of brush, shrubs, and trees according to the site location and description. There may be trees that exhibit higher hazard to personnel, property or infrastructure in their condition or precarious location that are included in this work. Work may be in wet areas, on riprap stone or steep slopes depending on the site conditions.
- Location The Hopkinton Lake Project office is located at 2097 Maple Street, Contoocook, New Hampshire. The Everett Lake Office is located at 395 Clough Park Rd. in Weare, New Hampshire. Together, these two projects have property boundaries in Henniker, Hopkinton, Dunbarton, and Weare, New Hampshire. The work sites are located within the project property at designated individual sites described within this Performance Work Statement.
- 3. Site Visit Contact the Technical Point of Contact (TPOC) to arrange a site visit. The Technical Point of Contact for the project is Park Ranger, Matthew Hackett (978) 318-8321 or Matthew.R.Hackett@usace.army.mil.
- 4. Schedule The period of performance will be 120 days from contract award. Work shall be performed Monday through Friday 7:30 AM to 4:00 PM unless otherwise approved by the Technical Point of Contact. No work shall be done on weekends or Government holidays.
- 5. Safety Requirements All work shall be conducted in accordance with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Safety and Health Requirements Manual (EM 385-1-1, most recent edition), and all applicable Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), federal, state, and local safety and health requirements. A copy of EM 385-1-1 can be accessed at the

project office or electronically at Headquarters USACE website under publications using the following link:

Project staff reserve the right to cease work at any time should the safety of employees, Contractors, and/or the public become jeopardized.

a. Accident Prevention Plan:

The Contractor shall prepare an Accident Prevention Plan (APP) specific to the activities being performed. It shall include Activity Hazard Analyses (AHAs) as described below. A non-mandatory, fillable APP template is available upon request. However, the Contractor is permitted to submit their own plan, at a minimum it must meet the requirements of EM 385-1-1, Appendix A, Section K.

A preparatory meeting shall be conducted by the Prime Contractor to discuss the APP contents with all effected onsite employees. The Prime Contractor is responsible for informing their subcontractors of the safety provisions under the terms of the contract, the penalties for noncompliance, and inspecting subcontractor operations to ensure that accident prevention responsibilities are being carried out.

b. Activity Hazard Analysis (AHA):

An AHA shall be submitted for each major phase of work. A major phase of work is defined as an operation involving a type of work presenting hazards not experienced in previous operations or where a new subcontractor or work crew is to perform the work. The analysis shall define all activities to be performed, identify the sequence of work, the specific hazards anticipated, and the control measures to be implemented to eliminate or reduce each hazard to an acceptable level. The AHA shall be continuously reviewed and revised to address changing site conditions as appropriate.

<u>COVID-19 NOTE</u>: As part of the APP and AHA's, include site specific COVID-19 monitoring procedures which address, at a minimum, the following elements:

- Procedures for periodic sanitation inspections.
- Procedures for disinfecting project sites in accordance with Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines.
- Site specific measures to practice social distancing while working on the project.
- Employee training on the signs, symptoms, and protection measures in accordance with CDC guidelines.
- A list of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to be used in accordance with CDC and state guidelines.

c. <u>Emergency Response:</u>

Emergency procedures shall be documented in the Accident Prevention Plan and will include a map with directions to the nearest hospital, emergency contact numbers, and onsite First Aid/CPR responders.

d. <u>Required Personnel:</u>

The Contractor shall employ a minimum of one Competent Person (CP) at each project site to function as the Site Safety and Health Officer (SSHO). The SSHO shall be present at the project site and report to the contractor's upper management. The SSHO is required to have related construction experience and have at a minimum completed a <u>10 Hour</u> <u>OSHA training</u>.

In addition, when emergency medical services are not accessible within five (5) minutes of the work location and there are two (2) or more workers onsite, <u>at least two (2)</u> <u>employees shall be trained in First Aid and CPR</u>. Minimum qualifications are listed in EM 385-1-1, Section 03.A.02.c.

Note: Other Competent or Qualified Persons may be required per EM 385-1-1 and/or other sections of this Performance Work Statement, based on the characteristics of the tasks.

e. Accident Reporting:

All accidents and near misses shall be investigated by the Contractor. All work-related recordable injuries, illnesses, and property damage accidents (excluding on-the-road vehicle accidents), in which the property damage exceeds \$5,000.00, shall be verbally reported to the TPOC within four (4) hours of the incident. Serious accidents as described in EM 385-1-1 Section 01.D shall be immediately reported to the TPOC. ENG Form 3394 shall be completed and submitted to the TPOC within five (5) working days of the incident.

The Contractor shall compile employee work hours (including subcontractors) and forward the total hours to the TPOC no later than close of business on the 10th calendar day of the following month. The method of transmission by the Prime Contractor to the TPOC shall be electronically.

- 6. Flooding Hopkinton Everett Lakes is primarily a Flood Risk Management Project. Occasional retention of floodwaters may inundate portions of the dam property or access roads in the areas covered by this contract. The Technical Point of Contact will notify the Contractor as areas are closed as a result of floodwaters. When flooding ends and waters recede, the Technical Point of Contact will notify the Contractor as areas reopen and services may resume.
- 7. Pre-Work Conference Prior to the start of any work, the Technical Point of Contact will schedule and conduct a "Pre-Work Conference". The Contractor's Project Manager and Quality Control Personnel will attend this meeting. This conference will be held at the time and location agreeable to the Government and Contractor. No work may be performed under this contract prior to this conference. The purpose of the conference is to enable the

Technical Point of Contact to outline the procedures that will be followed by the Government in its administration of the contract, and to discuss the performance that will be expected from the Contractor. This conference will allow the Contractor an opportunity to ask questions about the Government's administration and inspection of contract work or obtain other pertinent information that might be required. At the Pre-Work Conference the Contractor shall provide the name of the project superintendent with a telephone number for project coordination.

The following is a general list of items for discussion during this Pre-Work Conference:

- i. Authority of the Technical Point of Contact and Quality Assurance Inspectors.
- ii. Contractor's Safety Program (including sub-contractors).
- iii. Accident Prevention Plan and Activity Hazard Analysis (Submitted & accepted prior to start of work on site)
- iv. Safety Meetings (Documented on NED Form 251)
- v. Accident Reporting (ENG Form 3394)
- vi. Safety Data Sheet (SDS) requirements
- vii. Contractor's Equipment
- viii. Correspondence, Communication, Security and Administrative Procedures.
- ix. Invoice and payment.
- 8. Permits The Contractor shall, without additional expense to the Government, be responsible for obtaining any necessary licenses, permits*, and letters of certification. The Contractor shall comply with any applicable Federal, State, County, and Municipal laws, codes, and regulations in connection with the performance of the work specified under this contract.

*The Technical Point of Contact shall provide the Contractor with any Threatened and Endangered Species Consultation and any restrictions as part of this contract.

- **9.** Security The Contractor will comply with all established security policies at the Hopkinton-Everett Lakes Project. Due to periods of heightened security that may affect the access to the areas covered under this contract, the Government reserves the right to close any property or portion of property and reschedule and/or cancel any subsequent service. The Contractor shall be given at least 24-hour notice of any such closure.
- 10. Payment The Contractor shall furnish the Technical Point of Contact with one invoice per month. The invoice shall include the invoice date, contract number, dates of service, description of work, quantities, labor hours, and total amount due per line item. The invoice must also include the company letterhead, and this must match the data that is registered in the System for Award Management (SAM) registry. Payment shall be made monthly for the actual services performed at the applicable contract unit price.

II. Technical Requirements: Part 1 General:

- Summary Furnish all equipment, materials, labor, and transportation necessary to
 perform mechanical vegetation removal at seven (7) locations around the HopkintonEverett Lakes Project. This work shall include the cutting, removal, mulching or
 chipping of brush, shrubs, and trees according to the site location and description.
 There may be trees that exhibit higher hazard to personnel, property or infrastructure
 in their condition or precarious location that are included in this work. Work may be
 in wet soil areas, on riprap, or steep slopes depending on the site conditions.
 Contractor's work and responsibility shall include, but not be limited to, all job
 planning, programming, scheduling, administration, inspection, personnel, equipment,
 vehicles, fuel, materials, supplies, supervision, and quality control necessary to
 perform the various services required herein.
- 2. Submittals Although the Government reviews submissions for technical data/information required by this Performance Work Statement, it is emphasized that the Contractor's work must be completed using proper internal controls and review procedures. The documents identified below must be prepared in accordance with the applicable standards, submitted to the Technical Point of Contact for review and must be accepted by the Government prior to the commencement of any field activities.
 - Accident Prevention Plan (APP) Prior to the start of field work.
 - Activity Hazard Analysis Prior to the start of field work.
 - All Certifications and Licenses as determined by the scope of work.
- 3. References All work shall be in conformance with:
 - a. U.S Army Corps of Engineers (USACE)
 - i. EM-385-1-1 Safety and Health Requirements Manual, U.S. Army Engineering Manual.
 - **b.** Code of Federal Regulations (CFR)
 - i. Title 36 Parks, Forests, and Public Property; Chapter III Corps of Engineers, Department of the Army.
 - c. Other appropriate Federal, State, and Local codes for such an installation.
- 4. Other Contracts The Government may undertake or award other contracts for additional work not related to this contract, and the Contractor shall fully cooperate with other contractors and Government employees. The Contractor shall not commit or permit any act which will interfere with the performance of work by another contractor or by Government employees.

- 5. Preferred Sequence for Work Schedules The Contractor must provide sufficient personnel and equipment to accomplish services stated in the contract. The Contractor will coordinate a work schedule for each service, and approximate times for beginning and ending of each required service listed with the Technical Point of Contact. Any changes or alterations to the schedule must be coordinated and approved by the Technical Point of Contact in advance of actual schedule changes.
- 6. Clean Up and Waste Disposal The Contractor shall practice good housekeeping to maintain a safe job site. The Contractor shall keep the work area, including any designated storage areas free from accumulation of waste materials. Upon completing work in an area, the Contractor shall remove any tools, equipment, and materials that are not the property of the Government. Any and all disturbed areas resulting from Contractor activities shall be restored by the Contractor to the satisfaction of the Technical Point of Contact. All waste material will be disposed of offsite in accordance with all Federal, State, and Local regulations.
- 7. Environmental Protection Containers for excess and/ or waste materials, rubbish, etc. shall be provided by the Contractor at the site, and the site will be inspected/ cleaned daily when working onsite. Water, air, and land resources shall not be adversely impacted during the course of the work. The Contractor will take necessary steps to ensure all Federal, State, and Local environmental regulatory requirements are met at no additional cost to the Government. Assurance of compliance with this section by subcontractors shall be the responsibility of the Contractor.
- **8. Personal Protective Equipment** It is the Contractor's responsibility to furnish and supply personnel with the proper personal protective equipment necessary for performing the work.
- **9. Government Resources** The Government will provide gate access to all necessary locations. There is not a restroom available at the contract site, and there is no access to potable water at the contract site. The Contractor would have to provide these resources or have an acceptable alternative plan for these resources. The Government will assist in restricting public access to potentially unsafe work areas.
- 10. Damage to Government and Private Property The Contractor shall be responsible for restoring all Government facilities or structures damaged as a result of the Contractor's operation. The Contractor shall also be responsible for any damage to private property or injury to any person as a result of the Contractor's operation. The Contractor shall notify the Technical Point of Contact immediately of damage to Government and private property and injury to any person resulting from the Contractor's operation. Also, the Contractor shall notify the Technical Point of Contact of damage to Government facilities due to vandalism or other causes on the day such damage is first noticed. Trucks and/or trailers will be driven on existing roads only and not across or through park areas to facilities. The Contractor shall also restore landscape features (shrubs, flowers, grasses, etc.), which are damaged or destroyed by the Contractor's operation. Damaged or destroyed grass areas shall be re-

planted as directed by the Technical Point of Contact, and shrubs and flowers which are damaged or destroyed shall be replaced from nursery stock of like size and kind.

11. Contractor's Qualifications -

a. Experience:

i. The Contractor shall be able to demonstrate at least 3 years' experience with Mechanical Brush and Tree Removal.

b. License and/or Certifications:

- i. All work shall be performed by Qualified Personnel
- **ii.** The Contractor shall have the appropriate current license issued by the State for the work required and shall obtain and comply with any other necessary licenses or permits prior to beginning any work.
- **iii.** The Contractor shall provide documentation of the appropriate licenses and certifications to the Technical Point of Contact.

12. Contractor's Personnel -

a. Minimum Personnel Requirements - The Contractor shall provide an adequate number of fully qualified personnel to perform the specified service properly and efficiently within the time limits specified. The Contractor shall provide a list of the names and contact phone numbers for all employees prior to them working on Government Property.

Note: At least one (1) of the Contractor employees on site shall be able to communicate effectively and efficiently with project staff.

b. Employee Conduct - The Contractor shall be responsible for seeing that the Contractor's employees strictly comply with Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Title 36, Chapter III, Part 327 and all Federal, State, and Municipal laws. Any personnel activity, which, in the opinion of the Government, is deemed detrimental to the performance of the contract may result in the removal of Contractor employee(s).

Examples of unbecoming actions or conduct include but are not limited to the following:

- i. Cursing, harassment, or discrimination of and/or unwarranted physical contact with visitors, Corps personnel, or other contractors
- **ii.** Recurring written and/or verbal complaints from visitors, Corps personnel, or other contractors.
- iii. Unsafe operation of vehicles while on US Army Corps of Engineers property.
- **c. Removal of Contractor's Employees** The Technical Point of Contact may require the Contractor to immediately remove from the work site any employee of

the Contractor or subcontractor, who, in the opinion of the Technical Point of Contact, who endangers persons or property, or whose physical or mental condition is such that it would impair the employee's ability to satisfactorily perform assigned work. Notification to the Contractor shall be promptly made in writing if time and circumstances permit. Otherwise, notification shall be verbal or by telephone, and shall be confirmed in writing as soon as possible. No such removal, however, will reduce the Contractor's obligation to perform all work required under this contract, and immediate replacement will be made as required. This requirement shall not be made the basis of any claim for compensation or damages against the United States or any of its officers or agents.

13. Quality Assurance – The Contractor is responsible for the quality control of the contract work. The Contractor shall establish and maintain a quality control system to assure compliance with the contract requirements. The Government has the right to inspect and test all items called for by the contract, to the extent practicable always and at all places during the term of the contract.

14. Inspections-

- **a.** Contractor Quality Control The Contractor is responsible for establishing and maintaining an adequate quality control system to satisfactorily inspect and ensure that all work performed by the Contractor's organization in each separate service is in full compliance with this contract and the instructions, provisions, specifications, drawings, and maps herein.
- b. General Inspection Upon the completion of each service requirement, the Contractor will perform an inspection of all areas under this contract to ensure compliance with the Performance Work Statement. The Contractor or their representative must be able to commit personnel, equipment, and resources to correct deficiencies. The Services Inspection Form (form to be provided to the Contractor at the pre-work conference) will be submitted to the Technical Point of Contact to allow verification of results for payment. A Government representative may accompany the Contractor on an inspection of completed work and will identify any contract deficiencies. Any deficiencies noted will be corrected within original contract time frames or appropriate deductions in payment will be made.
- c. Equipment/Supplies Inspections The Technical Point of Contact may inspect required equipment and, supplies at any time when in use on Government property. Any equipment found deficient shall be removed from service immediately until faulty conditions have been corrected and passed by the Technical Point of Contact. No such removal will reduce the Contractor's obligation to perform all work required within the time scheduled under this contract. This requirement shall not be made the basis of any claim for compensation or damages against the United States or any of its officers or agents.

- **d. Government Inspections** The Government will monitor the Contractor's service performance and make deductions accordingly.
- **15. Receiving and Storing Materials** The Contractor is responsible for protecting any stored material until it is placed in service. The Contractor is responsible for receiving and unloading of delivered goods. Government employees will not receive materials or supplies for the Contractor and will not be responsible for damage to the Contractor's equipment or materials.
- 16. Omissions This contract may not cover all specified activities, steps, and procedures required to supply the contract product. In case of omission, the normal industry, state, or federal standards, practices, specifications, and/or guides shall prevail. In no instance shall an omission be reason to produce less than an acceptable product.

Part 2 Equipment:

- 1. Condition of Equipment– All equipment used to perform work under this contract must be in good operating and mechanical condition and comply with EM 385-1-1, Army Corps of Engineers Safety and Health Requirements. A regular schedule of preventive maintenance must be followed on all equipment. All vehicles utilized under this contract will be presentable, serviceable, and shall comply with safety standards.
 - **a.** Types of equipment for this work may include but not be limited to:
 - i. Non-Motorized hand tools such as Hand saws and Loppers
 - ii. Small, motorized hand tools such as Chainsaws and Brush Cutters
 - iii. Small to industrial sized Chippers
 - iv. Fixed tooth or flail style mower heads attached to appropriately sized equipment such as tracked excavators, skid steer machines, or tractors
 - v. Other equipment related to vegetation removal as determined by the service requirements of this Performance Work Statement.
 - **NOTE:** Transportation and Fuel costs to and from the project location shall be included in the quote amount for each location and service.
 - **NOTE:** No heavy equipment or machinery will be allowed to drive across the riprap slope of the dam, dike, spillway, and terrace or levee unless approved in writing by the Technical Point of Contact.
 - **NOTE:** Use caution around power lines that may exist at work sites.

Part 3 Service Description:

1. Brush Shrub and Small Tree Removal:

a. The Contractor shall remove the brush, shrubs, or trees less than and including 3 inches in diameter. (Trees – Diameter at breast height – DBH; Brush and Shrubs – Diameter at ground level).

b. The trees shall be felled and/or shrubs shall be cut down and the stumps shall be cut flush with the ground.

2. Tree Removal:

- **a.** The Contractor shall remove trees and / or trim tree limbs of varying sizes according to the specific service requirements. This may include trees that have already fallen into the designated work areas.
- **b.** The trees shall be felled, and the stumps shall be cut flush with the ground.

3. Hazard Tree Removal:

- **a.** The Contractor shall remove all or part of trees that have become a hazard to personnel, property, or infrastructure.
- **b.** The trees will range in size and are likely in a precarious position with the likelihood of placing property or infrastructure at risk during the removal.
- **c.** Whole or partial trees felled shall also be grubbed and the stumps shall be cut flush with the ground.

4. Wood Chipping:

- **a.** The Contractor shall chip all brush, shrubs, trees, and limbs up to and including a maximum diameter of 6 inches.
- **b.** No chip piles shall exceed 3' in height or 75' in diameter.
- **c.** Trees and limbs larger than 6 inches must be taken offsite by the contractor unless directed by the Technical Point of Contact.

<u>NOTE</u>: All materials, including wood chips, shall be removed offsite, unless directed by the Technical Point of Contact to leave the material at location.

Part 4 Service Requirements:

- 1. Everett Dam Spillway; rock slope edges:
 - **a.** Brush Shrub and Small Tree Removal: All vegetation must be removed or chipped within the mapped / flagged area, including vegetation found growing on and through the fence.
 - **b.** Tree Removal: Remove <u>all</u> trees within mapped and / or flagged area. Cut and remove <u>all</u> trees between the fence and the spillway ledge including trees growing in the ledge and fence. Trees must be hauled off site or chipped.
 - **c.** Wood Chipping: All vegetation 6 inches and smaller must be chipped. All chipping must be done outside of the spillway field areas and **NO** wood chips shall be broadcast into the spillway. Woodchips may be broadcast into adjacent wooded areas.
 - d. Aerial photo of work area shown in Exhibit A.
 - e. Area is approximately 1.91 acres.

2. Everett Lake West Side Road:

a. Brush Shrub and Small Tree Removal: All vegetation 3 inches or less in diameter must be removed from the mapped area.

- **b.** Tree Removal: Remove all trees marked with pink marking tape. The marked trees consist of 4 trees that range from 8-12 inches DBH. Cut and remove tree limbs overhanging the road to a height of 15 feet above the road surface.
- **c.** Wood Chipping: All vegetation 6 inches and smaller must be chipped. No piles of wood chips can remain in the road. Wood chips may be broadcast into the adjacent wooded area.
- d. Aerial photo of work area shown in Exhibit B.
- e. Area is approximately 1.34 acres.

3. Old 114 Habitat Field Restoration:

- **a.** Brush Shrub and small Tree Removal: Remove all brush and trees from the mapped work area.
- b. Tree Removal: All vegetation 3 12 inches DBH must be removed from the mapped area. Additionally, 3 trees marked with orange marking tape must be cut and removed. The marked trees are approximately 4" DBH, 6" DBH, and 8" DBH. All tree limbs overhanging the Northern perimeter of the field must be cut to a height of 15 feet above the ground.

islands". Trees with limbs that overhang the field must have limbs cut to a height of 15 feet above the ground.

6. North Weir:

Brush Shrub and Small Tree Removal:** Remove all brush and small trees from the East side of Sugar Hill Road to the water's edge, as well as the two mapped areas on the West side of Sugar Hill Road. All vegetation 3 inches or less in diameter must be removed or chipped from within the mapped area.
- **b.** Wood Chipping: All vegetation 6 inches and smaller must be chipped. Wood chips may not be broadcast into any waterbody.
- c. Aerial photo of work area shown in Exhibit F.
- d. Area is approximately 2.94 acres.

7. Hopkinton Spillway North:

- **a. Brush Shrub and Small Tree Removal:** All vegetation must be removed or chipped within the mapped area North or Rt. 127, including vegetation found growing on and through the fence. All vegetation 3 inches or less in diameter must be removed or chipped from within the mapped areas.
- **b.** Tree Removal: All trees 3 -12 inches DBH must be cut and removed, including trees growing in and around the fence and the rock slope.
- **c.** Wood Chipping: All vegetation 6 inches and smaller must be chipped. All chipping must be done outside of the spillway field areas and **NO** wood chips shall be broadcast into the spillway. Woodchips may be broadcast into adjacent wooded areas.

- e. Area is approximately 0.88 acres.

Part 5 Service Locations:

1. ITEM NO. 1 - Everett Dam Spillway; rock slope edges:

- **a.** Access: Site can be accessed via a small access road with a locked gate South of the Everett Dam Project Office parking area at 395 Clough Park Rd Weare, NH. This access road leads into the lower part of the Everett Dam Spillway. Equipment can be staged at the work site or at the Everett Dam Project office parking area. Metal tracked equipment may not travel on Clough Park Road.
- **b.** Site information: The work area is narrow and found on the edge of a rock formation that has areas of that drop off, some areas up to 15 feet.

The West Side Road is narrow and, in some areas, has water at both sides of the road. Caution must be used going through the gate, over the log boom chain and maneuvering down the steep hill. Metal treaded equipment must not maneuver across the crest of the dam, or cause damage to the road surfaces. Trailer turn around space is limited at the "gazebo area".
- **b.** Site Information: This area can have high recreation visitation and will require signs to warn the public of the work being performed.
- c. Work Area is approximately 1.34 acres including the road as shown in Exhibit B.

3. <u>ITEM NO.3 - Old 114 Habitat Field Restoration:</u>

- **a.** Access: Site can be accessed from River Road in Henniker, NH. Turn North onto the "Old 114 trail" through the gate. Field access is .5 miles from the gate on left side. The equipment can be staged on site at this location.
- **b.** Site Information: Area is an historic agricultural field with Speckled Alder, Pine, and Aspen that is growing in and around the field.
- c. Work Area is approximately 0.58 acres as shown in Exhibit C.

4. ITEM NO.4 - Elm Street Habitat Field Restoration:

- **a.** Access: Site can be accessed from Elm Street in Henniker, NH. Park at the parking area near the gate shown in Exhibit D. Field access is halfway down the access trail on the right side in an opening in the stone wall. The equipment can be staged in the parking area at this location.
- **b.** Site Information: Area is an historic agricultural field with Speckled Alder, Pine, and Aspen that is growing in and around the field. Species of vines are overtaking many of the perimeter trees and overgrowing the bushes and shrubs within the stonewalls, and along the access trail. Any fallen trees shall also be removed from the field and access trail.

There are two (2) apple trees in the work area that must have shrubs, vines and brush removed from the base of the trees without damaging the trees.

c. Work Area is approximately 0.81 acres as shown in Exhibit D.

5. ITEM NO.5 - Choate Marsh Habitat Field Restoration:

- **a.** Access: Site can be accessed from Sewell Hoyt (State Gate) OHRV trail located at the Hopkinton-Everett Riding Area (OHRV Park) from Ray Road in Dunbarton, NH. Park and stage the equipment at the OHRV parking area for this location.
- **b.** Site Information: Area is an historic agricultural field with Speckled Alder, Pine, and Aspen that is growing in and around the field. Species of vines are overtaking many of the perimeter trees and overgrowing the bushes and shrubs within the stonewalls. Field has fallen trees and rocks that are hidden by vegetation. There is a stonewall that follows the Western edge of the field that cannot be seen because of dense vegetation. Any fallen trees shall be removed from the field.
- c. Work Area is approximately 1.94 acres as shown in Exhibit E.

6. ITEM NO. 6 - North Weir:

- **a.** Access: Site is located along Sugar Hill Rd in Hopkinton, NH adjacent to Drew Lake. Parking for equipment and vehicles will be roadside at this location.
- **b.** Site Information: The area has an active brook (Elm Brook) that runs from Drew Lake in the North Western direction into Hopkinton Lake. Work areas are on both sides of Elm Brook, as well as along a small strip of ground between Drew Lake and Sugar Hill Rd.
- **c.** Work area is approximately 2.94 acres total for 3 separate areas as shown in Exhibit F.

7. ITEM NO. 7 - Hopkinton Spillway North:

- a. Access: Parking and access has two possible locations; 1: Park and stage vehicles and equipment at the "Cressy Brook access" from the top of Cressy Brook Road in Contoocook, NH. 2: Park and stage vehicles and equipment in the North West entrance of the Spillway located West of the spillway bridge on Rt 127 (Maple Street) in Contoocook, NH. This area is a shoulder of Rt 127 and therefore will have moderate vehicular traffic passing by.
- **b.** Site Information: Two of the work areas are fences close to the tree lines on the East and West of the Spillway. One of the locations is on a rock sloped edge that has approximately 12 foot drop off into the Spillway nearest to Maple Street. Special caution must be taken for the area that has a drop off. All trees that are growing on the rock slope must be removed from the area and either taken off site, or chipped at the location, above the spillway channel. The Eastern fence area must be cleared of all overhanging branches to a height of 15 feet above the ground. All leaning trees that could fall onto the fence must be removed.
- **c.** Work area is approximately 0.88 acres total for 3 separate work areas as shown in Exhibit G.

In determining whether affiliation exists, consideration is given to all appropriate factors including common ownership, common management, and contractual relationships. SBA determines affiliation based on the factors set forth at 13 CFR 121.103.

VACATION: 1 week paid vacation after 1 year of service with a contractor or successor; 2 weeks after 2 years; and 3 weeks after 10 years. 1) COMPUTER EMPLOYEES: Under the SCA at section 8(b) this wage determination does not apply to any employee who individually qualifies as a bona fide executive administrative or professional employee as defined in 29 C.F.R. Part 541. Because most Computer System Analysts and Computer Programmers who are compensated at a rate

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not less than \$27.63 (or on a salary or fee basis at a rate not less than \$455 per week) an hour would likely qualify as exempt computer professionals (29 C.F.R. 541. 400) wage rates may not be listed on this wage determination for all occupations within those job families. In addition because this wage determination may not list a wage rate for some or all occupations within those job families if the survey data indicates that the prevailing wage rate for the occupation equals or exceeds \$27.63 per hour conformances may be necessary for certain nonexempt employees. For example if an individual employee is nonexempt but nevertheless performs duties within the scope of one of the Computer Systems Analyst or Computer Programmer occupations for which this wage determination does not specify an SCA wage rate then the wage rate for that employee must be conformed in accordance with the conformance procedures described in the conformance note included on this wage determination.

Additionally because job titles vary widely and change quickly in the computer industry job titles are not determinative of the application of the computer professional exemption. Therefore the exemption applies only to computer employees who satisfy the compensation requirements and whose primary duty consists of:

(1) The application of systems analysis techniques and procedures including consulting with users to determine hardware software or system functional specifications;

(2) The design development documentation analysis creation testing or modification of computer systems or programs including prototypes based on and related to user or system design specifications;

(3) The design documentation testing creation or modification of computer programs related to machine operating systems; or

(4) A combination of the aforementioned duties the performance of which requires the same level of skills. (29 C.F.R. 541.400).

2) AIR TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS AND WEATHER OBSERVERS - NIGHT PAY & SUNDAY PAY: If you

work at night as part of a regular tour of duty you will earn a night differential and receive an additional 10% of basic pay for any hours worked between 6pm and 6am. If you are a full-time employed (40 hours a week) and Sunday is part of your regularly scheduled workweek you are paid at your rate of basic pay plus a Sunday premium of 25% of your basic rate for each hour of Sunday work which is not overtime (i.e. occasional work on Sunday outside the normal tour of duty is considered overtime work).

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** HAZARDOUS PAY DIFFERENTIAL **

An 8 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a high degree of hazard when working with or in close proximity to ordnance explosives and incendiary materials. This includes work such as screening blending dying mixing and pressing of sensitive ordnance explosives and pyrotechnic compositions such as lead azide black powder and photoflash powder. All dry-house activities involving propellants or explosives. Demilitarization modification renovation demolition and maintenance operations on sensitive ordnance explosives and incendiary materials. All operations involving re-grading and cleaning of artillery ranges.

A 4 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a low degree of hazard when working with or in close proximity to ordnance (or employees possibly adjacent to) explosives and incendiary materials which involves potential injury such as laceration of hands face or arms of the employee engaged in the operation irritation of the skin minor burns and the like; minimal damage to immediate or adjacent work area or equipment being used. All operations involving unloading storage and hauling of ordnance explosive and incendiary ordnance material other than small arms ammunition. These differentials are only applicable to work that has been specifically designated by the agency for ordnance explosives and incendiary material differential pay.

** UNIFORM ALLOWANCE **

If employees are required to wear uniforms in the performance of this contract (either by the terms of the Government contract by the employer by the state or local law etc.) the cost of furnishing such uniforms and maintaining (by laundering or dry cleaning) such uniforms is an expense that may not be borne by an employee where such cost reduces the hourly rate below that required by the wage determination. The Department of Labor will accept payment in accordance with the following standards as compliance:

The contractor or subcontractor is required to furnish all employees with an adequate number of uniforms without cost or to reimburse employees for the actual cost of the uniforms. In addition where uniform cleaning and maintenance is made the responsibility of the employee all contractors and subcontractors subject to this wage determination shall (in the absence of a bona fide collective bargaining agreement providing for a different amount or the furnishing of contrary

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affirmative proof as to the actual cost) reimburse all employees for such cleaning and maintenance at a rate of \$3.35 per week (or \$.67 cents per day). However in those instances where the uniforms furnished are made of ""wash and wear"" materials may be routinely washed and dried with other personal garments and do not require any special treatment such as dry cleaning daily washing or commercial laundering in order to meet the cleanliness or appearance standards set by the terms of the Government contract by the contractor by law or by the nature of the work there is no requirement that employees be reimbursed for uniform maintenance costs.

** SERVICE CONTRACT ACT DIRECTORY OF OCCUPATIONS **

The duties of employees under job titles listed are those described in the ""Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations"" Fifth Edition (Revision 1) dated September 2015 unless otherwise indicated.

** REQUEST FOR AUTHORIZATION OF ADDITIONAL CLASSIFICATION AND WAGE RATE Standard Form 1444 (SF-1444) **

Conformance Process:

The contracting officer shall require that any class of service employee which is not listed herein and which is to be employed under the contract (i.e. the work to be performed is not performed by any classification listed in the wage determination) be classified by the contractor so as to provide a reasonable relationship (i.e. appropriate level of skill comparison) between such unlisted classifications and the classifications listed in the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(i)). Such conforming procedures shall be initiated by the contractor prior to the performance of contract work by such unlisted class(es) of employees (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(ii)). The Wage and Hour Division shall make a final determination of conformed classification wage rate and/or fringe benefits which shall be paid to all employees performing in the classification from the first day of work on which contract work is performed by them in the classification. Failure to pay such unlisted employees the compensation agreed upon by the interested parties and/or fully determined by the Wage and Hour Division retroactive to the date such class of employees commenced contract work shall be a violation of the Act and this contract. (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(v)). When multiple wage determinations are included in a contract a separate SF-1444 should be prepared for each wage determination to which a class(es) is to be conformed.

The process for preparing a conformance request is as follows:

1) When preparing the bid the contractor identifies the need for a conformed occupation(s) and computes a proposed rate(s).

2) After contract award the contractor prepares a written report listing in order the proposed classification title(s) a Federal grade equivalency (FGE) for each proposed classification(s) job description(s) and rationale for proposed wage rate(s) including information regarding the agreement or disagreement of the authorized representative of the employees involved or where there is no authorized representative the employees themselves. This report should be submitted to the contracting officer no later than 30 days after such unlisted class(es) of employees performs any contract work.

3) The contracting officer reviews the proposed action and promptly submits a report of the action together with the agency's recommendations and pertinent information including the position of the contractor and the employees to the U.S. Department of Labor Wage and Hour Division for review (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(ii)).

4) Within 30 days of receipt the Wage and Hour Division approves modifies or disapproves the action via transmittal to the agency contracting officer or notifies the contracting officer that additional time will be required to process the request.

5) The contracting officer transmits the Wage and Hour Division's decision to the contractor.

6) Each affected employee shall be furnished by the contractor with a written copy of such determination or it shall be posted as a part of the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(iii)).

Information required by the Regulations must be submitted on SF-1444 or bond paper.

When preparing a conformance request the ""Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations"" should be used to compare job definitions to ensure that duties requested are not performed by a classification already listed in the wage determination. Remember it is not the job title but the required tasks that determine whether a class is included in an established wage determination. Conformances may not be used to artificially split combine or subdivide classifications listed in the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.152(c)(1)).

*This rate is to be used only when compensating employees for performance on an SCAcovered contract also covered by EO 13706 Establishing Paid Sick Leave for Federal Contractors. A contractor may not receive credit toward its SCA obligations for any paid sick leave provided pursuant to EO 13706.

VACATION: 1 week paid vacation after 1 year of service with a contractor or successor; 2 weeks after 2 years; and 3 weeks after 10 years. Length of service includes the whole span of continuous service with the present contractor or successor wherever employed and with the predecessor contractors in the performance of similar work at the same Federal facility. THE OCCUPATIONS WHICH HAVE NUMBERED FOOTNOTES IN PARENTHESES RECEIVE THE FOLLOWING:

1) COMPUTER EMPLOYEES: Under the SCA at section 8(b) this wage determination does not apply to any employee who individually qualifies as a bona fide executive administrative or professional employee as defined in 29 C.F.R. Part 541. Because most Computer System Analysts and Computer Programmers who are compensated at a rate not less than \$27.63 (or on a salary or fee basis at a rate not less than \$455 per week) an hour would likely qualify as exempt computer professionals (29 C.F.R. 541. 400) wage rates may not be listed on this wage determination for all occupations within those job families. In addition because this wage determination may not list a wage rate for some or all occupations within those job families if the survey data indicates that the prevailing wage rate for the occupation equals or exceeds \$27.63 per hour conformances may be necessary for certain nonexempt employees. For example if an individual employee is nonexempt but nevertheless performs duties within the scope of one of the Computer Systems Analyst or Computer Programmer occupations for which this wage determination does not specify an SCA wage rate then the wage rate for that employee must be conformed in accordance with the conformance procedures described in the conformance note included on this wage

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determination.

Additionally because job titles vary widely and change quickly in the computer industry job titles are not determinative of the application of the computer professional exemption. Therefore the exemption applies only to computer employees who satisfy the compensation requirements and whose primary duty consists of:

(1) The application of systems analysis techniques and procedures including consulting with users to determine hardware software or system functional specifications;

(2) The design development documentation analysis creation testing or modification of computer systems or programs including prototypes based on and related to user or system design specifications;

(3) The design documentation testing creation or modification of computer programs related to machine operating systems; or

(4) A combination of the aforementioned duties the performance of which requires the same level of skills. (29 C.F.R. 541.400).

2) AIR TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS AND WEATHER OBSERVERS - NIGHT PAY & SUNDAY PAY: If you

work at night as part of a regular tour of duty you will earn a night differential and receive an additional 10% of basic pay for any hours worked between 6pm and 6am. If you are a full-time employed (40 hours a week) and Sunday is part of your regularly scheduled workweek you are paid at your rate of basic pay plus a Sunday premium of 25% of your basic rate for each hour of Sunday work which is not overtime (i.e. occasional work on Sunday outside the normal tour of duty is considered overtime work).

** HAZARDOUS PAY DIFFERENTIAL **

An 8 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a high degree of hazard when working with or in close proximity to ordnance explosives and incendiary materials. This includes work such as screening blending dying mixing and pressing of sensitive ordnance explosives and pyrotechnic compositions such as lead azide black powder and photoflash powder.

All dry-house activities involving propellants or explosives. Demilitarization modification renovation demolition and maintenance operations on sensitive

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ordnance explosives and incendiary materials. All operations involving re-grading and cleaning of artillery ranges.

A 4 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a low degree of hazard when working with or in close proximity to ordnance (or employees possibly adjacent to) explosives and incendiary materials which involves potential injury such as laceration of hands face or arms of the employee engaged in the operation irritation of the skin minor burns and the like; minimal damage to immediate or adjacent work area or equipment being used. All operations involving unloading storage and hauling of ordnance explosive and incendiary ordnance material other than small arms ammunition. These differentials are only applicable to work that has been specifically designated by the agency for ordnance explosives and incendiary material differential pay.

** UNIFORM ALLOWANCE **

If employees are required to wear uniforms in the performance of this contract (either by the terms of the Government contract by the employer by the state or local law etc.) the cost of furnishing such uniforms and maintaining (by laundering or dry cleaning) such uniforms is an expense that may not be borne by an employee where such cost reduces the hourly rate below that required by the wage determination. The Department of Labor will accept payment in accordance with the following standards as compliance:

The contractor or subcontractor is required to furnish all employees with an adequate number of uniforms without cost or to reimburse employees for the actual cost of the uniforms. In addition where uniform cleaning and maintenance is made the responsibility of the employee all contractors and subcontractors subject to this wage determination shall (in the absence of a bona fide collective bargaining agreement providing for a different amount or the furnishing of contrary affirmative proof as to the actual cost) reimburse all employees for such cleaning and maintenance at a rate of \$3.35 per week (or \$.67 cents per day). However in those instances where the uniforms furnished are made of ""wash and wear"" materials may be routinely washed and dried with other personal garments and do not require any special treatment such as dry cleaning daily washing or commercial laundering in order to meet the cleanliness or appearance standards set by the terms of the Government contract by the contractor by law or by the nature of the work there is no requirement that employees be reimbursed for uniform maintenance costs.

** SERVICE CONTRACT ACT DIRECTORY OF OCCUPATIONS **

The duties of employees under job titles listed are those described in the ""Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations"" Fifth Edition (Revision 1) dated September 2015 unless otherwise indicated.

** REQUEST FOR AUTHORIZATION OF ADDITIONAL CLASSIFICATION AND WAGE RATE Standard Form 1444 (SF-1444) **

Conformance Process:

The contracting officer shall require that any class of service employee which is not listed herein and which is to be employed under the contract (i.e. the work to be performed is not performed by any classification listed in the wage determination) be classified by the contractor so as to provide a reasonable relationship (i.e. appropriate level of skill comparison) between such unlisted classifications and the classifications listed in the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(i)). Such conforming procedures shall be initiated by the contractor prior to the performance of contract work by such unlisted class(es) of employees (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(ii)). The Wage and Hour Division shall make a final determination of conformed classification wage rate and/or fringe benefits which shall be paid to all employees performing in the classification from the first day of work on which contract work is performed by them in the classification. Failure to pay such unlisted employees the compensation agreed upon by the interested parties and/or fully determined by the Wage and Hour Division retroactive to the date such class of employees commenced contract work shall be a violation of the Act and this contract. (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(v)). When multiple wage determinations are included in a contract a separate SF-1444 should be prepared for each wage determination to which a class(es) is to be conformed.

The process for preparing a conformance request is as follows:

1) When preparing the bid the contractor identifies the need for a conformed occupation(s) and computes a proposed rate(s).

2) After contract award the contractor prepares a written report listing in order

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the proposed classification title(s) a Federal grade equivalency (FGE) for each proposed classification(s) job description(s) and rationale for proposed wage rate(s) including information regarding the agreement or disagreement of the authorized representative of the employees involved or where there is no authorized representative the employees themselves. This report should be submitted to the contracting officer no later than 30 days after such unlisted class(es) of employees performs any contract work.

3) The contracting officer reviews the proposed action and promptly submits a report of the action together with the agency's recommendations and pertinent information including the position of the contractor and the employees to the U.S. Department of Labor Wage and Hour Division for review (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(ii)).

4) Within 30 days of receipt the Wage and Hour Division approves modifies or disapproves the action via transmittal to the agency contracting officer or notifies the contracting officer that additional time will be required to process the request.

5) The contracting officer transmits the Wage and Hour Division's decision to the contractor.

6) Each affected employee shall be furnished by the contractor with a written copy of such determination or it shall be posted as a part of the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(iii)).

Information required by the Regulations must be submitted on SF-1444 or bond paper.

When preparing a conformance request the ""Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations"" should be used to compare job definitions to ensure that duties requested are not performed by a classification already listed in the wage determination. Remember it is not the job title but the required tasks that determine whether a class is included in an established wage determination. Conformances may not be used to artificially split combine or subdivide classifications listed in the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.152(c)(1)).
