A. GENERAL

1. Scope of Work

Contractor will provide all equipment, materials, labor, and transportation necessary to clean the interior of the Buffumville Lake office of residual ash and smoke damage due to an electrical fire.

2. Location

Buffunville Dam Office is located at 48 Old Oxford Rd., Charlton MA, 01507.

3. Site Visit

Contact the Technical Point of Contact (TPOC) to arrange a site visit. The Technical Point of

Contact for this project is Park Ranger James Higgins: (978) 318-8472 or James.J.Higgins@usace.army.mil.

4. Schedule

Work shall be completed no later than 30 days from the contract award date. Work shall be performed Monday through Friday between the hours of 7:00AM and 3:30PM unless otherwise approved by the TPOC. Any proposed changes to an approved schedule must be submitted to the TPOC in writing and are not finalized until approved. No work shall be done on weekends or Government holidays.

5. Safety

All work shall be conducted in accordance with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Safety and Health Requirements Manual (EM 385-1-1, most recent edition), and all applicable Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), federal, state, and local safety and health requirements. A copy of EM 385-1-1 can be accessed at the project office or electronically at Headquarters USACE website under publications using the following link: http://www.publications.usace.army.mil/Portals/76/Publications/EngineerManuals/EM_385-1-1.pdf

Project staff reserve the right to cease work at any time should the safety of employees, Contractors, and/or the public become jeopardized.

a. Abbreviated Accident Prevention Plan: The Contractor shall prepare an Abbreviated Accident Prevention Plan (AAPP) specific to the activities being performed. It shall include Activity Hazard Analyses (AHA's) as described below. A non-mandatory, fillable AAPP template is available upon request. However, the contractor is permitted to submit their own plan, at a minimum it must meet the requirements of EM 385-1-1, Appendix A, Section K.

A preparatory meeting shall be conducted by the Prime Contractor to discuss AAPP contents with all effected onsite employees. The Prime Contractor is responsible for informing the subcontractors of the safety provisions under the terms of the contract, the penalties for noncompliance, and inspecting subcontractor operations to ensure that accident prevention responsibilities are being carried out.

b. Activity Hazard Analysis (AHA): An AHA shall be submitted for each major phase of work. A major phase of work is defined as an operation involving a type of work presenting hazards not experienced in previous operations or where a new subcontractor or work crew is to perform the work. The analysis shall define all activities to be performed, identify the sequence of work, the specific hazards anticipated, and the control measures to be implemented to eliminate or reduce each hazard to an acceptable level. The AHA shall be continuously reviewed and revised to address changing site conditions as appropriate.

COVID-19 NOTE: As part of the AAPP and AHA's, include site specific COVID-19 monitoring procedures which address, at a minimum, the following elements:

- Procedures for periodic sanitation inspections.
- Procedures for disinfecting project sites in accordance with Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines.
- Site specific measures to practice social distancing while working on the project.
- Employee training on the signs, symptoms, and protection measures in accordance with CDC guidelines.
- A list of Personal Protective Equipment to be used in accordance with CDC and state guidelines.

Work shall not proceed on a phase of work until the AAPP and AHA's have been accepted by the Technical Point of Contact. A preparatory meeting shall be conducted by the prime contractor to discuss the AHA's contents with all effected onsite employees.

- **c.** <u>Emergency Response</u>: Emergency procedures shall be documented in the Abbreviated Accident Prevention Plan and will include a map with directions to the nearest hospital, emergency contact numbers, and onsite First Aid/CPR responders.
- **d.** Required Personnel: The Contractor shall employ a minimum of one Competent Person (CP) at each project site to function as the Site Safety and Health Officer (SSHO). The SSHO shall be present at the project site and report to the contractor's upper management. The SSHO is required to have related construction experience and have at a minimum completed a 10 Hour OSHA training.

In addition, when emergency medical services are not accessible within 5 minutes of the work location and there are 2 or more workers onsite, at least 2 employees shall have (inperson) training in First Aid and CPR. Minimum qualifications are listed in EM 385-1-1, Section 03.A.02.c.

e. Accident Reporting: All accidents and near misses shall be investigated by the Contractor. All work-related recordable injuries, illnesses, and property damage accidents (excluding on-the-road vehicle accidents), in which the property damage exceeds \$5,000.00, shall be verbally reported to the Technical Point of Contact within four (4) hours of the incident. Serious accidents as described in EM 385-1-1 Section 01.D shall be immediately reported to the Technical Point of Contact. ENG Form 3394 shall be completed and submitted to the Technical Point of Contact within five (5) working days of the incident.

The Contractor shall complete a "USACE Contractor Monthly Summary Record of Injuries/Illness and Work Hour Exposure" (for all employees including subcontractors) which shall be provided by the TPOC, and forward the completed form to the Technical Point of Contact no later than close of business on the 5th calendar day of the following month. The method of transmission by the Prime Contractor to the TPOC shall be electronically.

f. Templates for the Accident Prevention Plan, Weekly Safety Meeting, Activity Hazard Analysis, Contractor Monthly Record of Accidents, and the Accident Investigation ENG Form 3394 are all available upon request from the TPOC.

6. Public Health Closures

There may be Local or National events that require closure of the facilities to the public due to public health concerns. Such events may include epidemics, pandemics, or other similar circumstances. Upon notification of the closure from the TPOC, the Contractor will receive a notice of suspension of services from the Contracting Officer. The Contracting Officer will either suspend all services or partially suspend services in accordance with FAR 42.1303 and 52.212-4 and when public health concerns are relaxed the Contracting Officer will notify the Contractor that the suspension has been lifted and that the contractor may resume performance of the contract.

7. Flooding

Buffumville Lake is primarily a Flood Risk Management Project. Occasional retention of floodwaters may inundate portions of the dam property or access roads in the areas covered by this contract. The TPOC will notify the Contractor as areas are closed because of floodwaters. When flooding ends and waters recede, the TPOC will notify the Contractor as areas reopen and services may resume.

8. Pre-Work Conference

Prior to the start of any work, the contract awardee will schedule and conduct a "Pre-work Conference". The Contractor's Project Manager and Quality Control Personnel will attend this meeting. This meeting may be in person or over the phone. This conference will be held at the time and location agreeable to the government and contractor. No work may be performed under this contract prior to this conference. The purpose of the conference is to enable the TPOC to outline the procedures that will be followed by the Government in its administration of the contract, and to discuss the performance that will be expected from the Contractor. This conference will allow the Contractor an opportunity to ask questions about the Government's administration and inspection of contract work or obtain other pertinent information that might be required. At the Pre-work conference the contractor shall provide the name of the project superintendent with a telephone number for project coordination.

The following is a general list of items for discussion during this Pre-work Conference:

- i. Authority of the Technical Point of Contact and Quality Assurance Inspectors.
- ii. Contractor's Safety Program (including subcontractors).
- iii. Abbreviated Accident Prevention Plan & Activity Hazard Analysis
- iv. Accident Reporting (ENG Form 3394).
- v. Safety Data Sheet (SDS) requirements.
- vi. Correspondence, Communication and Administrative Procedures.
- vii. Invoices and Payment

9. Permits

The contractor shall, without additional expense to the Government, be responsible for obtaining any necessary licenses, permits, insurances and letters of certification. The Contractor shall comply with any applicable federal, state, county, and municipal laws,

codes, and regulations in connection with the performance of the work specified under this contract.

10. Security

The contractor will comply with all established security policies of the US Army Corps of Engineers. Due to periods of heightened security that may affect the access to the areas covered under this contract, areas may be subject to periodic closures, which in turn may reduce or inhibit the Contractor's ability to access certain areas. During periods of heightened security, the Government reserves the right, at any time, to close any property or portion of property and reschedule and/or cancel any subsequent service in an area. The Contractor shall be given at least 24-hour notice of any such closure.

11. Contractor Conduct

12. Payment

B. TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS

Part 1: General

1. **Summary**

Provide all equipment, cleaning materials, labor, and transportation necessary to clean the interior of the Buffumville Lake office of residual ash and smoke damage due to an electrical fire. The areas to be cleaned include furnished office spaces, a garage, tool and workshop spaces, and a furnace room. Contractor's work and responsibility shall include, but not be limited to, all job planning, programming, scheduling, administration, inspection, personnel, equipment, vehicles, fuel, materials, supplies, supervision, and quality control necessary to perform the various services required herein.

2. Submittals

Although the Government technically reviews submissions required by this scope of work, it is emphasized that the Contractor's work must be prosecuted using proper internal controls and review procedures. The documents identified below must be prepared in accordance with the applicable standards, submitted for review and accepted by the government prior to the commencement of any field activities. Associated cost must be included in initial quote.

- i. Abbreviated Accident Prevention Plan (AAPP), Template available upon request.
- ii. Activity Hazard Analysis (AHA), Template available upon request.
- **iii.** The Contractor shall submit one copy of the manufacturer's Safety Data Sheet for each chemical proposed for use.

3. Other Contracts

The Government may undertake or award other contracts for additional work not related to this contract, and the contractor shall fully cooperate with other contractors and Government employees. The Contractor shall not commit or permit any act which will interfere with the performance of work by another contractor or by government employees.

4. Clean Up and Waste Disposal

The Contractor shall practice good housekeeping to maintain a safe job site. The Contractor shall keep the work area, including any designated storage areas, free from accumulation of waste materials. Upon completing work in an area, the contractor shall remove any equipment and materials that are not the property of the government. Upon completion of work, the Contractor shall clean up the job site to the satisfaction of the Government. All chemical spills will be reported to the TPOC and cleaned up immediately. Contractor will use best practices to prevent spills or leakage of any hazardous material. Contractor will take immediate action to contain or minimize any spill or leak that may occur.

5. Environmental Protection

Water, air, and land resources shall not be adversely impacted during the work. The Contractor will take necessary steps to ensure all federal, state, and local environmental regulatory requirements are met at no additional cost to the Government. Assurance of compliance with this section by subcontractors shall be the responsibility of the contractor.

6. Sustainability & Environmentally Preferred Products

Under the Comprehensive Procurement Guidelines (CPG) program, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) designates products that are or can be made with recovered materials and recommends practices for buying these products. Any designated product that is being offered or supplied under this contract shall meet the minimum recommended content levels as identified under the CPG program. 7. Personal Protective Equipment

It is the Contractor's responsibility to furnish and supply personnel with the proper personal protective equipment necessary for performing the work.

8. Government Resources

The Government will supply any electricity necessary for the project work from points of existing outlets when and where available. The Government may also supply water, though the water may not be available immediately at all points within the facility. The Contractor shall carefully conserve the use of electricity and water provided. The Contractor shall supply their own means of communication (telephone).

9. Quality Assurance

The contractor is responsible for the quality control of the contract work. The Contractor shall establish and maintain a quality control system to assure compliance with the contract requirements. The Government has the right to inspect and test all items called for by the contract, to the extent practicable at all times and at all places during the term of the contract.

10. Damage to Government or Private Property

The Contractor shall be responsible for restoring any Government facilities or structures damaged as a result of the Contractor's operation. The Contractor shall also be responsible for any damage to private property or injury to any person as a result of the Contractor's operations. The Contractor shall notify the Technical Point of Contact and/or Project Manager immediately of damage to Government and private property and injury to any person resulting from the Contractor's operation. Also, the Contractor shall notify the Technical Point of Contact of damage to Government facilities due to vandalism or other causes on the day such damage is first noticed. Trucks and/or trailers will be driven on existing roads only and not across or through park areas to facilities. The Contractor shall also restore landscape features (shrubs, flowers, grasses, etc.), which are damaged or destroyed by the Contractor's operation. Damaged or destroyed grass areas shall be replanted as directed by the TPOC, and shrubs and flowers which are damaged or destroyed shall be replaced from nursery stock of like size and kind.

11. Contractor's Personnel

a. Minimum Personnel Requirements

The Contractor shall provide an adequate number of fully qualified personnel to perform the specified service properly and efficiently within the time limits specified. The Contractor shall provide a list of the names and contact phone numbers for all employees prior to them working on Government property. At least one of the Contractor's employees on site shall be able to communicate effectively and efficiently with project staff.

b. Employee Conduct

The Contractor shall be responsible for seeing that the Contractor's employees strictly comply with all federal, state, and municipal laws. Any personnel activity, which, in the opinion of the Government, is deemed detrimental to the performance of the contract may result in the removal of Contractor employee/employees.

c. Removal of Contractor's Employees

The TPOC may require the contractor to immediately remove from the work site any employee of the Contractor or Subcontractor, who, in the opinion of the TPOC, endangers persons or property, or whose physical or mental condition is such that it would impair the employee's ability to satisfactorily perform assigned work. Notification to the contractor shall be promptly made in writing if time and circumstances permit. Otherwise, notification shall be verbal or by telephone, and shall be confirmed in writing as soon as possible. No such removal, however, will reduce the Contractor's obligation to perform all work required under this contract, and immediate replacement will be made as required. This requirement shall not be made the basis of any claim for compensation or damages against the United States or any of its officers or agents.

12. Inspections

a. Contractor Quality Control

The Contractor is responsible for establishing and maintaining an adequate quality control system to satisfactorily inspect and ensure that all work performed by the Contractor's organization in each separate service is in full compliance with this contract and the instructions, provisions, specifications, drawings, and maps herein.

b. General Inspection

Upon the completion of each service requirement, the Contractor will perform an inspection of all areas under this contract to ensure compliance with the Performance Work Statement. The Contractor or their representatives must be able to commit personnel, equipment, and resources to correct deficiencies. The Services Inspection Form (form to be provided to the Contractor at the pre-work conference) will be submitted to the TPOC to allow verification of results for payment. A Government representative may accompany the contractor on an inspection of completed work and will identify any contract deficiencies. Any deficiencies noted will be corrected within original contract time frames or appropriate deductions in payment will be made.

c. **Equipment/Supplies Inspection**

The TPOC may inspect required equipment and supplies at any time when in use on Government property. Any equipment found deficient shall be removed from service immediately until faulty conditions have been corrected and passed by the TPOC. No such removal will reduce the Contractor's obligation to perform all work required within the time scheduled under this contract. This requirement shall not be made the basis of any claim for compensation or damages against the United States or any of its officers or agents.

d. Government Inspections

The Government will monitor the contractor's service performance and make deductions accordingly.

13. Receiving and Storing Materials

The Contractor is responsible for protecting any stored material until it is placed in service. The contractor is responsible for receiving and unloading of delivered goods. Government employees will not receive materials or supplies for the contractor and will not be responsible for damage to the contractor's equipment or materials.

14. Omissions

This contract may not cover all specified activities, steps, and procedures required to supply the contract product. In case of omission, the normal industry, state, or federal standards, practices, specifications, and/or guides shall prevail. In no instance shall an omission be reason to produce less than an acceptable product.

Part 2: Existing Conditions

1. Warm Bay Garage

The warm bay garage was the source of smoke and therefore the most damaged. The garage bay is used as a workshop and tool storage area.

- **a.** Room measures 31' in Length by 16' in Width with an 11' ceiling.
- **b.** South facing wall features overhead garage door.
- c. North facing wall is windowed with permanently fixed work counter.
- **d.** East & west facing walls feature hanging tool storage and shelving units. Sink.
- e. Cement flooring.
- **f.** The Hazmat room is not included in this work and services are not required in this space.

2. Hallway

Linoleum floored hallway with area rug which adjoins the warm bay garage, furnace room, and radio room.

- a. Room measures 12' in Length by 4' in Width with a 6' 8" drop ceiling.
- **b.** Ceiling composed of suspended ceiling tiles with one skylight.

3. Radio Room

Carpeted room with tool storage in the form of shelving and cabinets, as well as radio instrumentation.

- a. Room measures 15' 10" in Length by 12' 9" in Width with a 7' 9" ceiling.
- **b.** Ceiling composed of suspended ceiling tiles.
- c. West facing wall features open-faced tool shelving.
- **d.** East facing wall features countertop and wall-mounted radio instrumentation.
- e. South facing wall is windowed.

4. Furnace Room

Linoleum floored furnace room with heating oil tank, furnace, and standing cabinet units.

- a. Room measures 15' 6" in Length by 8' 7" in Width with an 11' ceiling.
- **b.** North facing wall is windowed with exterior doorway.

5. Electrical Room

Carpeted room with electrical panel access that adjoins the radio room and main entrance.

- a. Room measures 12' in Length by 12' in Width with an 8' ceiling.
- **b.** Ceiling composed of suspended ceiling tiles.
- c. North facing wall features wall-mounted electrical panels.
- **d.** South facing wall is windowed with standing pantries.

6. Main Entrance

Furnished, carpeted room which connects the electrical room and main office.

- **a.** Room measures 38' 8" in Length by 21' 8" in Width with a 9' ceiling.
- **b.** Ceiling composed of suspended ceiling tiles.
- **c.** Furnishings include half-walled cubicle area with counterspace, conference table, and display shelving with miscellanea.
- **d.** Twenty-five (25) taxidermy displays with habitat diorama.
- e. South facing wall is windowed with exterior doorway.
- **f.** Handicap accessible ramp from south wall to east wall.

7. Bathroom

Linoleum floored half-bathroom with hand-sink and toilet which adjoins main entrance.

- a. Room measures 10' 7" in Length by 8' in Width with a 6' 10" ceiling.
- **b.** Ceiling composed of suspended ceiling tiles.

8. Main Office

Furnished, wood-floored office space with kitchenette which adjoins the main entrance and back office.

- a. Room measures 23' in Length by 19' in Width with an 8' ceiling.
- **b.** Ceiling composed of suspended ceiling tiles.
- **c.** Furnishings include half-walled cubicle area with counterspace, leather sofa, table, storage cabinet, and kitchenette.
- **d.** North facing wall is windowed with exterior doorway and kitchenette. Kitchenette includes a mini refrigerator, microwave, countertops, cabinets, and hand-sink.

9. Back Office

Furnished, wood-floored office space which adjoins the main office.

- **a.** Room measures 15' in Length by 14' in Width with an 8' ceiling.
- b. Ceiling composed of suspended ceiling tiles with one skylight.
- c. Furnishings include two leather chairs, table, two storage cabinets, and office desk.
- d. North facing wall is windowed.

Part 3: Service Requirements

All products and methods used for this work shall be appropriate for the cleaning and restoration of spaces due to fire/smoke damage.

1. Warm Bay Garage

- **a.** Scrub and clean the floor, ceiling, wall surfaces, and horizontal surfaces.
- **b.** Scrub and clean the overhead garage door, framing, and lift motor.
- c. Scrub and clean all lighting fixtures.





1) COMPUTER EMPLOYEES: This wage determination does not apply to any individual employed in a bona fide executive, administrative, or professional capacity, as defined in 29 C.F.R. Part 541. (See 41 C.F.R. 6701(3)). Because most Computer

defined in 29 C.F.R. Part 541. (See 41 C.F.R. 6701(3)). Because most Computer Systems Analysts and Computer Programmers who are paid at least \$27.63 per hour (or at least \$684 per week if paid on a salary or fee basis) likely qualify as exempt computer professionals under 29 U.S.C. 213(a)(1) and 29 U.S.C. 213(a)(17), this wage determination may not include wage rates for all occupations within those job families. In such instances, a conformance will be necessary if there are nonexempt employees in these job families working on the contract.

Job titles vary widely and change quickly in the computer industry, and are not determinative of whether an employee is an exempt computer professional. To be exempt, computer employees who satisfy the compensation requirements must also have a primary duty that consists of:

- (1) The application of systems analysis techniques and procedures, including consulting with users, to determine hardware, software or system functional specifications;
- (2) The design, development, documentation, analysis, creation, testing or modification of computer systems or programs, including prototypes, based on and related to user or system design specifications;
- (3) The design, documentation, testing, creation or modification of computer programs related to machine operating systems; or
- (4) A combination of the aforementioned duties, the performance of which requires the same level of skills. (29 C.F.R. 541.400).

Any computer employee who meets the applicable compensation requirements and the above duties test qualifies as an exempt computer professional under both section 13(a)(1) and section 13(a)(17) of the Fair Labor Standards Act. (Field Assistance Bulletin No. 2006-3 (Dec. 14, 2006)). Accordingly, this wage determination will not apply to any exempt computer employee regardless of which of these two exemptions is

utilized.

2) AIR TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS AND WEATHER OBSERVERS - NIGHT PAY & SUNDAY PAY: If you

work at night as part of a regular tour of duty, you will earn a night differential and receive an additional 10% of basic pay for any hours worked between 6pm and 6am. If you are a full-time employed (40 hours a week) and Sunday is part of your regularly scheduled workweek, you are paid at your rate of basic pay plus a Sunday premium of 25% of your basic rate for each hour of Sunday work which is not overtime (i.e. occasional work on Sunday outside the normal tour of duty is considered overtime work).

** HAZARDOUS PAY DIFFERENTIAL **

An 8 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a high degree of hazard when working with or in close proximity to ordnance, explosives, and incendiary materials. This includes work such as screening, blending, dying, mixing, and pressing of sensitive ordnance, explosives, and pyrotechnic compositions such as lead azide, black powder and photoflash powder. All dry-house activities involving propellants or explosives. Demilitarization, modification, renovation, demolition, and maintenance operations on sensitive ordnance, explosives and incendiary materials. All operations involving re-grading and cleaning of artillery ranges.

A 4 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a low degree of hazard when working with, or in close proximity to ordnance, (or employees possibly adjacent to) explosives and incendiary materials which involves potential injury such as laceration of hands, face, or arms of the employee engaged in the operation, irritation of the skin, minor burns and the like; minimal damage to immediate or adjacent work area or equipment being used. All operations involving, unloading, storage, and hauling of ordnance, explosive, and incendiary ordnance material other than small arms ammunition. These differentials are only applicable to work that has been specifically designated by the agency for ordnance, explosives, and incendiary material differential pay.

** UNIFORM ALLOWANCE **

If employees are required to wear uniforms in the performance of this contract (either by the terms of the Government contract, by the employer, by the state or local law, etc.), the cost of furnishing such uniforms and maintaining (by laundering or dry cleaning) such uniforms is an expense that may not be borne by an

employee where such cost reduces the hourly rate below that required by the wage determination. The Department of Labor will accept payment in accordance with the following standards as compliance:

The contractor or subcontractor is required to furnish all employees with an adequate number of uniforms without cost or to reimburse employees for the actual cost of the uniforms. In addition, where uniform cleaning and maintenance is made the responsibility of the employee, all contractors and subcontractors subject to this wage determination shall (in the absence of a bona fide collective bargaining agreement providing for a different amount, or the furnishing of contrary affirmative proof as to the actual cost), reimburse all employees for such cleaning and maintenance at a rate of \$3.35 per week (or \$.67 cents per day). However, in those instances where the uniforms furnished are made of ""wash and wear"" materials, may be routinely washed and dried with other personal garments, and do not require any special treatment such as dry cleaning, daily washing, or commercial laundering in order to meet the cleanliness or appearance standards set by the terms of the Government contract, by the contractor, by law, or by the nature of the work, there is no requirement that employees be reimbursed for uniform maintenance costs.

** SERVICE CONTRACT ACT DIRECTORY OF OCCUPATIONS **

The duties of employees under job titles listed are those described in the ""Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations"", Fifth Edition (Revision 1), dated September 2015, unless otherwise indicated.

** REQUEST FOR AUTHORIZATION OF ADDITIONAL CLASSIFICATION AND WAGE RATE, Standard Form 1444 (SF-1444) **

Conformance Process:

The contracting officer shall require that any class of service employee which is not listed herein and which is to be employed under the contract (i.e., the work to be performed is not performed by any classification listed in the wage determination), be classified by the contractor so as to provide a reasonable relationship (i.e., appropriate level of skill comparison) between such unlisted classifications and the classifications listed in the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(i)). Such conforming procedures shall be initiated by the contractor prior to the performance of contract work by such unlisted class(es) of employees (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(ii)). The Wage and Hour Division shall make a final determination of conformed classification, wage rate, and/or fringe benefits which shall be paid to all employees performing in the classification from the first day

of work on which contract work is performed by them in the classification. Failure to pay such unlisted employees the compensation agreed upon by the interested parties and/or fully determined by the Wage and Hour Division retroactive to the date such class of employees commenced contract work shall be a violation of the Act and this contract. (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(v)). When multiple wage determinations are included in a contract, a separate SF-1444 should be prepared for each wage determination to which a class(es) is to be conformed.

The process for preparing a conformance request is as follows:

- 1) When preparing the bid, the contractor identifies the need for a conformed occupation(s) and computes a proposed rate(s).
- 2) After contract award, the contractor prepares a written report listing in order the proposed classification title(s), a Federal grade equivalency (FGE) for each proposed classification(s), job description(s), and rationale for proposed wage rate(s), including information regarding the agreement or disagreement of the authorized representative of the employees involved, or where there is no authorized representative, the employees themselves. This report should be submitted to the contracting officer no later than 30 days after such unlisted class(es) of employees performs any contract work.
- 3) The contracting officer reviews the proposed action and promptly submits a report of the action, together with the agency's recommendations and pertinent information including the position of the contractor and the employees, to the U.S. Department of Labor, Wage and Hour Division, for review (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(ii)).
- 4) Within 30 days of receipt, the Wage and Hour Division approves, modifies, or disapproves the action via transmittal to the agency contracting officer, or notifies the contracting officer that additional time will be required to process the request.
- 5) The contracting officer transmits the Wage and Hour Division's decision to the contractor.
- 6) Each affected employee shall be furnished by the contractor with a written copy of such determination or it shall be posted as a part of the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(iii)).


Information required by the Regulations must be submitted on SF-1444 or bond paper.


When preparing a conformance request, the ""Service Contract Act Directory of

Occupations"" should be used to compare job definitions to ensure that duties requested are not performed by a classification already listed in the wage determination. Remember, it is not the job title, but the required tasks that determine whether a class is included in an established wage determination. Conformances may not be used to artificially split, combine, or subdivide classifications listed in the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.152(c)(1))."


