Recreational Opportunities at Federal Flood Risk Management Reservoirs and the Cape Cod Canal in 2016

#### Introduction

Recreational opportunities abound at U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Cape Cod Canal and federal flood risk management reservoirs in New England. Most areas usually feature small lakes with facilities designed for day use such as picnicking, swimming, boating, fishing and hunting. There are also a few facilities for overnight camping.

Fishing is permitted at all federal flood risk management reservoirs in Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Vermont. The only requirement to fish is a state license and adherence to state regulations. Check with state agencies for seasons and complete regulations. Many areas are stocked by state fish and wildlife agencies.

Developed facilities are available at a number of locations. Many of these areas are open to individuals or small groups free of charge. Large groups may be required to reserve group use picnic shelters, with picnic tables and grills, which are available at many sites, with additional fees for extra tables and for a 15-amp electrical circuit (if available). Special use permit fees are required if an individual or group/organization is conducting a nonpublic use activity (field trials, race event, camporee, boat regatta, fishing derby, music-cultural festival) where management control is appropriate. It should be noted that extra sanitation, trash collection, or grass mowing are to be provided by the permittee, and a performance bond may be required. Athletic playing fields, available at many sites, may be reserved for a fee.

Specific information about facilities and fees is listed on the following pages. Additional information may be obtained by calling or visiting the website of the Cape Cod Canal or the appropriate project office listed in the project description. With the exception of fishing, which is dictated by state fishing seasons, most recreation areas are open from Memorial Day through the middle of September.

The National Recreation Reservation Service (NRRS) makes it possible for campers to make reservations for campsites at our three campgrounds, as well as nearly 40,000 Corps of Engineers and USDA Forest Service campsites nationwide. Campers can reserve campsites as much as 240 days in advance and for as long as 14 nights in one location. It is now possible to camp your way across the U.S.A., entirely at federal campgrounds, with the peace of mind that your campsite is there waiting for you each night. A camper can also log on the NRRS web site and do all the reservation transactions on the internet. Outreach programs and presentations by Park Rangers on a variety of subjects are available to schools and civic organizations by request. Popular subjects include environmental education, the water cycle and conservation, water safety, and the history and functions of the Corps of Engineers. In addition, during the summer, interpretive programs are scheduled for visitors at many projects. Programs may include visits to the dam, natural science, local history, recreation safety, "Junior Park Ranger" programs, fishing, etc.

# America the Beautiful the National Parks, Federal Recreation Lands passes

On Jan. 1, 2016, about 240 Corps recreation projects nationwide began issuing America the Beautiful National Parks and Federal Recreational Lands Interagency Passes: 1) Interagency Senior Pass, \$10, valid for lifetime of the pass owner and must be 62 or older and a U.S. citizen or a permanent resident; 2) Interagency Access Pass, free for lifetime with documentation of permanent disability for U.S. citizens or permanent residents; 3) Interagency Annual Pass, \$80, anyone can purchase this pass; 4) Interagency Military Pass, free to current U.S. military members and their dependents; 5) Interagency Every Kid in a Park 4<sup>th</sup> Grade Pass, free to current 4<sup>th</sup> grade students with valid Every Kid in a Park voucher (visit: <a href="https://www.everykidinapark.gov">www.everykidinapark.gov</a> for details); and 6) Interagency Volunteer Pass, earned with 250-plus hours of volunteer service on public lands. These passes allow their holders free access to boat launches and swimming beaches managed by the Corps.

Senior and Access America the Beautiful passes also provide holders a 50 percent discount on campsites at Corps-managed campgrounds. Additionally, the Corps will continue to sell its own annual day use pass, which allows visitors free access to boat launches and swimming beaches managed by the Corps. **BLACK ROCK LAKE**, Thomaston, Route 109. While there are no developed facilities, a 21-acre lake is stocked with trout and also offers bass, pickerel, perch, bullhead, and bluegill. The surrounding Corps- and state-owned land offers opportunities for hiking and hunting. Black Rock Lake is open from the third Saturday in April through Columbus Day. For up-to-date information, call (860) 283-4900 or 283-5540. Alcohol is prohibited at this facility. The website is

Camping, swimming, and day use activities are available at the nearby Black Rock State Park on U.S. Route 6. For more information on Black Rock State Park, call CTDEP at (860) 283-8088. (NRB).

**COLEBROOK RIVER LAKE,** Colebrook, Route 8. One mile of stream fishing and a seasonal lake of over 700 acres offer trout, bass, pickerel, and perch. A boat ramp and parking are available. Boating is prohibited within 100 feet of the dam and intake tower. The maximum speed limit is 20 mph. Water contact sports are also prohibited at this facility. Downstream of the old Route 8 Bridge at the upper end of the reservoir, either Massachusetts or Connecticut fishing licenses may be used, but Connecticut fishing regulations and designated seasons apply. Upstream of the old Route 8 Bridge Massachusetts fishing licenses and regulations apply. There are no fees for use of the facilities at Colebrook, which is open to the public year-round. HANCOCK BROOK LAKE, Plymouth, Waterbury Road. This area affords opportunities for hiking, fishing, and hunting. Tributary streams in the reservoir are stocked with trout and the 40-acre lake offers warm water fish such as bass, perch, bullhead, pickerel, and panfish. The area also contains a remote control model aircraft field managed under a cooperative agreement via the CT Model Airplane Club. Additional parking for recreational activities is available at the intersection of Keegan Road and Todd Hollow Road. For upto-date information, call (203) 729-8840. The website is

**HOP BROOK LAKE**, Middlebury, Route 63. The Corps has instituted Lake Management practices to improve the habitat for largemouth bass and other warm water species. Developed facilities at this area include three 30 x 44-foot and one 18 x 36-foot picnic shelters. A ball field also may be reserved for a fee, either separately or in conjunction with any of the picnic shelters. Other facilities/opportunities at Hop Brook Lake include

restrooms, picnic tables, grills, drinking water, a swimming beach, sand volleyball courts, disc golf, and hiking trails. Park user fees are in effect during the project recreation season which is from the weekend before the Memorial Day holiday weekend through the weekend after Labor Day. **MANSFIELD HOLLOW LAKE,** Mansfield, Route 6 or Route 195. A 450-acre statemanaged lake, with a boat ramp, affords free boating and fishing opportunities. Stocked trout may be caught in the outlet area below the dam, and the lake supports warm water fishing for bass, hornpout, and perch. Large group activities, such as bass tournaments, require a state permit. Other facilities/opportunities include restrooms, drinking water, uncovered picnic areas, hiking trails, and hunting. NORTHFIELD BROOK LAKE, Thomaston, Route 254. There are two picnic shelters (18 x 32 and 18 x 36 feet), which may be reserved for a fee. The eight-acre pool is stocked with trout and also has warm water fish species. Note that this facility may be converting to a dry bed reservoir in 2015. Please call the project office for up to date information. Other facilities and opportunities include restrooms, drinking water, picnic tables, grills, horseshoe pits, and hiking trails. The project is open from the third Saturday in April through Columbus Day. For up-to-date information, call (860) 283-5540. **THOMASTON DAM**, Thomaston, Route 222. The main stem of the Naugatuck River supports trout and warm water fish species and is designated as a trophy trout stream and a broodstock salmon area by the CT DEP. Leadmine Brook is stocked with brown-, brookand rainbow trout. Recreation facilities include restrooms, drinking water, horseshoe pits, uncovered picnic area, hunting, remote control model aircraft field managed under a cooperative agreement with the CT Nutmeg Flyers, and a designated motorized trail bike (seasonal, 2-wheel only) and snowmobile area (seasonal). The project is open from the third Saturday in April through Columbus Day. For up-to-date information, especially for motorbike and snowmobile area availability, call (860) 283-5540. **WEST THOMPSON LAKE**, Thompson, Route 12. The 200-acre lake has a boat ramp and supports bass, perch, pickerel, and hornpout. The campground is open from the third Friday in May through the Sunday after Labor Day. Fees are charged for use of campsites. Some sites are equipped with water and electricity. Showers and restrooms free. Firewood is available for purchase. Camping reservations may be arranged through the National Recreation Reservation Service at 1-877-444-6777 or <a href="www.recreation.gov">www.recreation.gov</a>. A 22 x 36-foot picnic shelter, two 30 x 44-foot shelters, and several group use areas may be reserved for a fee and require a special use permit. Group activities such as bass tournaments, field dog trails, and Scout group campouts require a special use permit. An 18-hole disc golf course is available for use by the public free of charge. **BARRE FALLS DAM**, Barre and Hubbardston, Route 62. Picnicking, hiking, canoeing, winter sports, watching wildlife, mountain biking, hunting, and fishing are popular at Barre Falls. The Ware River is stocked with brook-, brown-, and rainbow trout. The project is crossed by the Mid-State Hiking Trail. An 18-hole disc golf course, horseshoe pits and a volleyball court are available for use by the public free of charge. Interpretive programs are given by the Park Rangers as requested by organized groups. Volunteers are welcome to participate on recreation related work projects. A 20 x 36-foot picnic shelter may be reserved for a fee. For information call (978) 928-4712. **BIRCH HILL DAM**, South Royalston, Route 68 to dam area; Winchendon, Route 202 to Lake Dennison. Lake Dennison Recreation Area is managed by the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation. Lake Dennison has a large campground with drinking water, restrooms, dump station, nature trail, and swimming. Other recreation facilities include a swimming beach, picnic tables, fireplaces, and a boat launch. Warm water fish species in Lake Dennison include pickerel, bullhead, and smallmouth bass. Lake Dennison is also stocked with trout. Elsewhere in the Birch Hill reservoir area hiking, hunting, mountain biking, snowmobiling, cross country skiing, and stream fishing are permitted. **BUFFUMVILLE LAKE**, Charlton, off Route 12. The 200-acre lake has a boat ramp and offers fishing for bass, pickerel, perch, and catfish. Buffumville Park offers picnicking, a swimming beach, restrooms, and a seven-mile hiking and mountain bike trail. There is a fee to use the beach. A volleyball court, two horseshoe pits, as well as two picnic shelters, can be reserved by groups for a fee. Most facilities in Buffumville Park are barrier free. At nearby Buffumville Dam, there is a free 27-hole disc (frisbee) golf course and a pond for ice skating in the winter. Hunting is allowed at Buffumville Lake outside developed areas. CAPE COD CANAL, Buzzards Bay. I-195 from Providence, RI, I-495 from points west or Route 3 from Boston, MA. The Canal is the gateway to Cape Cod. 13.5 miles of paved service roads along both sides of the waterway are available for public recreation. Recreational opportunities include bicycling, in-line skating, walking, jogging, fishing, and hiking. The Canal provides a unique, close-up view of ocean-going vessels from a simple working tug to a large container ship to a stunning luxury yacht. Access points, equipped with restrooms, picnic areas, and parking lots, are located along the Canal off major roadways. Saltwater fishing is permitted from the Canal banks in all areas except the Massachusetts Maritime Academy and the Canal Administrative Area in Buzzards Bay. Fishing access is also available along the Sandwich bulkhead and the Scusset Beach fishing pier. Fishing by boat in the Canal is prohibited. Saltwater fishing is subject to state regulations. As of 2011, all persons age 16 and over recreationally fishing in Massachusetts marine waters are required to purchase a MA Recreational Saltwater Fishing permit or possess a recreational saltwater fishing permit from a state that has a reciprocity agreement with Massachusetts (NH, RI and CT). Licenses can be obtained at www.mass.gov/eea/agencies/dfg/licensing/. The taking of herring is subject to State and Town regulations. Due to decreased fish stock, the Herring Run is closed to any taking in 2016. For information call 508-759-4431 and ask to speak with a Park Ranger. Park Rangers offer free interpretive programs on a variety of topics including children's programs, guided walks, and evening programs during the summer and early fall. The Cape Cod Canal Visitor Center on Ed Moffitt Drive in Sandwich is opened seasonally. Housed in a former Coast Guard boathouse, the center features films about canal history, wildlife and wildflowers. Visitors of all ages may enjoy interactive exhibits on the Canal's rich history, unique features and marine operations. Highlights include a retired 41-foot patrol boat as well as live radar and camera images of the waterway. A small bookstore as well as tide charts, canal guides and brochures are available. CHARLES RIVER NATURAL VALLEY STORAGE AREA, Eastern Massachusetts. The Charles River Natural Valley Storage Area (CRNVSA), comprised of 3,210 acres of land owned in fee and 4,891 acres of flowage easement, is located in portions of the towns of Bellingham, Dedham, Dover, Franklin, Holliston, Medfield, Medway, Millis, Natick, Needham, Newton, Norfolk, Sherborn, Walpole, West Roxbury and Wrentham occupying three counties. The CRNVSA reduces downstream flooding by using those 8,000 acres of wetlands to absorb and slow down storm-water runoff. Visitors can boat, canoe, fish, hike, hunt or view wildlife. In Millis, a car top public access to the Charles River is located on Forest Street. **CONANT BROOK DAM,** Monson, off Route 32 on Monson-Wales Road. This 469-acre site offers stream fishing for trout along Conant and Vinica brooks, and warm water fishing above the dam. The area has miles of trails for horseback riding, hiking, cross-country skiing, and snowshoeing. For up-to-date information, call (508) 347-3705. **EAST BRIMFIELD LAKE**, Fiskdale, Route 20. The 360-acre lake has two boat ramps located on the north and south sides of Route 20, in Sturbridge. The lake supports bass,

perch, northern pike, and hornpout. Winter ice fishing is especially popular. The area also features a swimming beach, picnic areas, restrooms and drinking water at Lake Siog (Holland Pond), which is open three days per week, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, from 10:00 a.m.- 6:00 p.m., on Dug Hill Road off of East Brimfield-Holland Road. Canoe and boat launches on Lake Siog are located off of Pond Bridge Road, also in Holland. The swimming area off of Dug Hill Road and the launches off of Pond Bridge Road are a five-minute ride from Route 20. The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Management stocks trout. A short hiking trail is located at East Brimfield Dam, off of Route 20, at the end of Riverview Avenue. Barrier-free fishing access is available off of Champeau Road. HODGES VILLAGE DAM, Oxford, off Route 12. Over 30 miles of trails are maintained at Hodges Village. Opportunities include nature study, hiking, fishing, mountain biking, hunting, snowmobiling, and dirt biking. A canoe launch and parking area serve the French River above and below the dam. The French River also is accessible for canoeing from Greenbrier Park at the upstream end of the project. Greenbrier Park, operated by the Town of Oxford, also provides tennis courts, baseball fields, a running track, and a skateboard park. **KNIGHTVILLE DAM**, Huntington off Route 112. Indian Hollow Campground may be reserved by groups or civic organizations for a fee. Recreation facilities at Knightville Dam include picnic tables with grills, restrooms, and a picnic shelter. Groups may reserve the 20 x 36-foot shelter. Call (413) 667-3430 for fees and other information regarding reserving the shelter. Group campground reservations can be made by calling NRRS at 877-444-6777. Fly fishing is popular in the Little and Westfield rivers where brown-, brook, and rainbow trout are stocked. Only artificial lures may be used in the catch and release area of the East Branch of the Westfield River from the gate just north of the parking lot on Old Valley Road north to Chesterfield Gorge. South of the gate, the daily limit is three trout. MassWildlife stocks game birds in the Knightville Basin during the upland game hunting season. Other recreational opportunities at Knightville include the Claude M. Hill Horse Trail, hiking trails, snowmobiling, cross country skiing and mountain biking west of the Westfield River, watching wildlife, and hunting. For up-to-date information, call (413) 667-3430. LITTLEVILLE LAKE, Huntington off Route 112, Littleville Road and Goss Hill Road. The 275-acre lake, with boat ramp, is stocked with brook-, rainbow-, and brown trout, in addition to native populations of warm water fish. Littleville Lake is one of the most popular fishing spots in western Massachusetts. Stream fishing for a daily limit of three trout is available along 1-1/2 miles of the Middle Branch of the Westfield River in Chester. Hunting for deer and upland game birds also is permitted at Littleville Lake in season. For up-to-date information, call (413) 667-3656. The website is

**TULLY LAKE**, Royalston, Route 32. Tully Lake is a beautiful 200-acre gem, popular among hikers, picnickers and paddlers. There are two boat launching areas: motorboats up to the 10 horsepower limit may be launched at the ramp at the Tully Lake Recreation Area; canoes and kayaks may be launched at the Tully River Canoe Launch. Anglers catch bass, perch, black crappie, and pickerel from the lake and Long Pond. Trout are stocked by MassWildlife north of State route 68 in Royalston. There are trails for mountain biking adjacent to the Tully River, and hiking around the lake and to nearby waterfalls. The picnic area has pit toilets, tables, and grills, but no running water. A 44-person picnic shelter may be reserved for a fee. An 18-hole disc golf course lies on the south side of the lake. For more information visit

Tully Lake Campground (call 978-249-4957) offers 36 tents-only campsites each with a fire ring and table, accessible by foot or boat. Operated by The Trustees of Reservations on the shore of Tully Lake, the campground offers access to over 20 miles of hiking trails including the Tully Trail, and the Lake Trail, with scenic vistas and waterfalls. Canoe and kayak rentals available. It is open from early May to late October. WEST HILL DAM, Uxbridge, between Route 16 and Route 122 on East Hartford Avenue. There are two miles of stream fishing along the trout-stocked West River. Bass, pickerel, and hornpout also can be found in the river. West Hill Dam offers a swimming beach, picnic tables, grills, restrooms, drinking water, hiking trails, mountain bike trail, wheelchair accessible playground, horseshoe pit, sandlot volleyball court and hunting. Two picnic shelters in West Hill Park, 30' x 44' and 20' x 36', each having picnic tables and grills may be reserved for a fee. A new shelter, 20' x 36' at the area near the dam with tables, grill and electric may be reserved for a fee. **WESTVILLE LAKE,** Southbridge and Sturbridge, Wallace Road off Route 131. There are five miles of stream fishing along the trout-stocked Quinebaug River. The 23-acre lake supports bass, pickerel and perch. A boat ramp is available. Occasionally, large pike that have moved downstream from the East Brimfield reservoir may be taken at this lake. The area also provides handicap accessible parking, restrooms, numerous picnic tables and charcoal grills. Ballfields, drinking water, boating and hunting areas are available for your enjoyment. Trails for hiking, cross-country skiing and snowshoeing are also available. Two picnic shelters, 30 x 44-foot and 20 x 40 foot, can be reserved for a fee.
