



Recreational Opportunities at Federal Flood Risk Management Reservoirs and the Cape Cod Canal 2022

Introduction

Recreational opportunities abound at U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Cape Cod Canal and federal flood risk management reservoirs in New England. Most areas usually feature small lakes with facilities designed for day use such as picnicking, swimming, boating, fishing and hunting. There are also a few facilities for overnight camping.

Fishing is permitted at all federal flood risk management reservoirs in Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Vermont. The only requirement to fish is a state license and adherence to state regulations. Check with state agencies for seasons and complete regulations.

Developed facilities are available at a number of locations. Many of these areas are open to individuals or small groups free of charge. Large groups may be required to reserve group use picnic shelters, with picnic tables and grills, which are available at many sites, with additional fees for extra tables and for a 15-amp electrical circuit (if available). Special use permit fees are required if an individual or group/organization is conducting a nonpublic use activity (field trials, race event, camporee, boat regatta, fishing derby, music/cultural festival) where management control is appropriate. It should be noted that extra sanitation, trash collection, or grass mowing are to be provided by the permittee, and a performance bond may be required. Athletic playing fields, available at many sites, may be reserved for a fee.

Specific information about facilities and fees is listed on the following pages and additional information may be obtained by calling or visiting the site. Most recreation areas are open from Memorial Day through the middle of September, except for fishing opportunities, which comply with state fishing seasons.

The Recreation One Stop makes it possible for campers to make reservations for campsites at our three campgrounds, in addition to nearly 40,000 U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and USDA Forest Service campsites nationwide. Outreach programs and presentations by USACE Park Rangers on a variety of subjects are available to schools and civic organizations by request. Popular subjects include environmental education, the water cycle and conservation, water safety, and the history and functions of USACE. In addition, during the summer, interpretive programs are scheduled for visitors at many projects. Programs may include visits to the dam, natural science lessons, local history, recreation safety, "Junior Park Ranger" programs, fishing, etc.

America the Beautiful - the National Parks, Federal Recreation Lands passes Approximately 240 USACE recreation projects nationwide began issuing America the Beautiful National Parks and Federal Recreational Lands Interagency Passes on Jan. 1, 2016. These include 1) Interagency Senior Pass, \$80, valid for lifetime of the pass owner and available to U.S. citizens and permanent residents age 62 or older; 2) Interagency Senior Annual Pass \$20, valid one year from month of purchase, available to U.S. citizens or permanent residents 62 or older, the Senior Annual Pass can be upgraded to the Lifetime Senior Pass by exchanging four previously purchased Senior Annual Passes or paying the difference between the purchase of one to three Senior Annual Passes to equal the value of the Senior Lifetime Pass, \$80. 3) Interagency Access Pass, free for lifetime with documentation of permanent disability for U.S. citizens or permanent residents; 4) Interagency Annual Pass, \$80, anyone can purchase this pass; 5) Interagency Military Pass, free to current U.S. military members and their dependents; 6) Interagency Every Kid in a Park 4th Grade Pass, free to current 4th grade students with valid Every Kid in a Park voucher (visit: www.everykidinapark.gov for details); and 7) Interagency Volunteer Pass, earned with 250-plus hours of volunteer service on public lands. These passes allow their holders free access to boat launches and swimming beaches managed by USACE.

Senior and Access America the Beautiful passes also provide holders a 50 percent discount on campsites at USACE-managed campgrounds. Additionally, USACE will continue to sell its own annual day use pass for \$40, which allows visitors free access to boat launches and swimming beaches managed by USACE. BLACK ROCK LAKE, Thomaston, Route 109. While there are no developed facilities, a 21-acre lake is stocked with trout and also offers bass, pickerel, perch, bullhead, and bluegill. The surrounding USACE- and state-owned land offers opportunities for hiking and hunting. Black Rock Lake is open from the third Saturday in April through Columbus Day. For up-to-date information, call (860) 283-4900 or 283-5540. Alcohol is prohibited at this facility. The website is https://www.nae.usace.army.mil/Missions/Recreation/Black-Rock-Lake/.

Camping, swimming, and day use activities are available at the nearby Black Rock State Park on U.S. Route 6. For more information on Black Rock State Park, call CTDEEP at (860) 283-8088.

COLEBROOK RIVER LAKE, Colebrook, Route 8. One mile of stream fishing and a seasonal lake of over 700 acres offer trout, bass, pickerel, and perch. A boat ramp and parking are available. Boating is prohibited within 100 feet of the dam and intake tower. The maximum speed limit is 20 mph. Water contact sports are also prohibited at this facility. Downstream of the old Route 8 bridge at the upper end of the reservoir, either Massachusetts or Connecticut fishing licenses may be used, but Connecticut fishing regulations and designated seasons apply. Upstream of the old Route 8 bridge Massachusetts fishing licenses and regulations apply. The North End of the project and the boat launch are open the third Saturday in April to Dec. 1 or the first significant snow. The Boat Launch - open 3rd Saturday in April to Dec. 1 or the first significant snow. The office and dam area are open Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. year-round, weather/conditions permitting. There are no fees for use of the facilities at Colebrook. HANCOCK BROOK LAKE, Plymouth, Waterbury Road. This area affords opportunities for hiking, fishing, and hunting. Tributary streams in the reservoir are stocked with trout and the 40-acre lake offers warm water fish such as bass, perch, bullhead, pickerel, and panfish. Additional parking for recreational activities is available at the intersection of Keegan Road and Todd Hollow Road. For up-to-date information, call (203) 729-8840. HOP BROOK LAKE, Middlebury, Route 63. USACE has instituted lake management practices on the 21-acre lake to improve the habitat for largemouth bass and other warm water species. Developed facilities at this area include three 30 x 44-foot and one 18 x 36-foot picnic shelters. A ball field also may be reserved for a fee, either separately or in conjunction with any of the picnic shelters. Other facilities/opportunities include restrooms, picnic tables, grills, drinking water, a swimming beach, sand volleyball courts, and hiking trails. The park recreation season is from the weekend before the Memorial Day holiday through the weekend after Labor Day. MANSFIELD HOLLOW LAKE, Mansfield, Route 6 or Route 195. A 450-acre statemanaged lake, with a boat ramp, affords free boating and fishing opportunities. Stocked trout may be caught in the outlet area below the dam, and the lake supports warm water fishing for bass, hornpout, and perch. Large group activities, such as bass tournaments, require a state permit. Other facilities/opportunities include restrooms, drinking water, uncovered picnic areas, hiking trails, and hunting. NORTHFIELD BROOK LAKE, Thomaston, Route 254. There are two picnic shelters (18 x 32 feet and 18 x 36 feet), which may be reserved for a fee. The eight-acre pool is stocked with trout and has warm water fish species. Other facilities and opportunities include restrooms, drinking water, picnic tables, grills, horseshoe pits, and hiking trails. The project is open from the third Saturday in April through Columbus Day. For up-to-date information, call (860) 283-5540. THOMASTON DAM, Thomaston, Route 222. The main stem of the Naugatuck River supports trout and warm water fish species and is designated as a trophy trout stream and a broodstock salmon area by the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection. Leadmine Brook is stocked with brown-, brook-, and rainbow trout. Recreation facilities include restrooms, drinking water, horseshoe pits, uncovered picnic area, hunting, remote control model aircraft field, and a designated motorized trail bike (seasonal, 2-wheel only). WEST THOMPSON LAKE, Thompson, Route 12. The 200-acre lake has a boat ramp and supports bass, perch, pickerel, and hornpout. The campground is open from the third Friday in May through the Sunday after Labor Day. The campground consists of 11 sites with water and electric, 11 sites without, and 2 lean-to shelters. Fees vary depending on site type and firewood is available for purchase. Camping reservations may be arranged through Recreation One Stop at 1-877-444-6777 or www.recreation.gov. A 22 x 36-foot picnic shelter, and two 30 x 44-foot shelters, may be reserved for a fee and require a special use permit; as do fishing tournaments. An 18-hole disc golf course is available for use by the public free of charge. West Thompson also offers hiking trails, hunting, snowmobiling, and free public programs. BARRE FALLS DAM, Barre and Hubbardston, Route 62. Picnicking, hiking, canoeing, winter sports, watching wildlife, mountain biking, hunting, and fishing are popular at Barre Falls. The Ware River is stocked with brook-, brown-, and rainbow trout. The project is crossed by the Mid-State Hiking Trail. An 18-hole disc golf course, horseshoe pits and a volleyball court are available for use by the public free of charge. Interpretive programs are given by the Park Rangers as requested by organized groups. Volunteers are welcome to participate on recreation related work projects. A 20 x 36-foot picnic shelter may be reserved for a fee. For information call 978-318-8905. The website is

BIRCH HILL DAM, South Royalston, Route 68 to dam area; Winchendon, Route 202 to Lake Dennison. Lake Dennison Recreation Area is managed by the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation. Lake Dennison has a large campground with drinking water, restrooms, dump station, nature trail, and swimming. Other recreation facilities include a swimming beach, picnic tables, fireplaces, and a boat launch. Warm water fish species in Lake Dennison include pickerel, bullhead, and smallmouth bass. Lake Dennison is also stocked with trout. Elsewhere in the Birch Hill reservoir area hiking, hunting, mountain biking, snowmobiling, cross country skiing, and fishing are permitted. Brook, brown, and rainbow trout are caught in the Millers River and its tributaries. The consumption of fish taken from the Millers River below its confluence with the Otter River in Templeton is discouraged. BUFFUMVILLE LAKE, Charlton, off Route 12. The 200-acre lake has a boat ramp and offers fishing for bass, pickerel, perch, and catfish. Buffumville Park offers picnicking, a swimming beach, restrooms, and a seven-mile hiking and mountain bike trail. The Park is open May to September and there is a day use fee to use the beach. A volleyball court, a horseshoe pit, and two picnic shelters, can be reserved by groups for a fee. Shelter reservations can be arranged through Recreation One Stop at 1-877-6777 or www.recreation.gov. Most facilities in Buffumville Park are barrier-free. At nearby Buffumville Dam, there is a free 18-hole disc golf course and a pond for ice skating in the winter. Hunting is allowed at Buffumville Lake outside developed areas. CAPE COD CANAL, Bourne and Sandwich. I-195 from Providence, Rhode Island, I-495 from points west or Route 3 from Boston. As a busy navigable waterway, the Cape Cod Canal provides a unique, close-up view of ocean-going vessels from a simple working tug to a large container ship to a stunning luxury yacht. 13.5 miles of paved service roads along both sides of the waterway are available for public recreation. Recreational opportunities include bicycling, in-line skating, walking, jogging, saltwater fishing, and hiking. Access points, equipped with restrooms, picnic areas, and parking lots, are located along the Canal off major roadways. Fishing by boat in the Canal is prohibited. Saltwater fishing is subject to state regulations. Visit www.mass.gov/massfishhunt for more details. Camping is available along the Canal at Bourne Scenic Park (www.bournescenicpark.com) and Scusset Beach State Reservation (www.reserveamerica.com). A swimming beach is also available at Scusset Beach; entrance fees apply. Park Rangers offer a variety of free interpretive programs including children's programs, guided walks, and evening programs during the summer and early fall. The Cape Cod Canal Visitor Center on Ed Moffitt Drive in Sandwich is open May through October. Housed in a former Coast Guard boathouse, the center features films and interactive exhibits about the Canal's history and operations, as well as local wildlife. Highlights include a retired 41-foot patrol boat and live radar and camera images of the waterway. Canal brochures and guides and a small bookstore are available. NATURAL VALLEY STORAGE CHARLES RIVER AREA. Eastern Massachusetts. The Charles River Natural Valley Storage Area (CRNVSA), comprised of 3,210 acres of land owned in fee and 4,891 acres of flowage easement, is in portions of the towns of Bellingham, Dedham, Dover, Franklin, Holliston, Medfield, Medway, Millis, Natick, Needham, Newton, Norfolk, Sherborn, Walpole, West Roxbury and Wrentham occupying three counties. The CRNVSA reduces downstream flooding by using those 8,000 acres of wetlands to absorb and slow down storm-water runoff. Visitors can boat, canoe, fish, hike, hunt or view wildlife. CONANT BROOK DAM, Monson, off Route 32 on Monson-Wales Road. This 469-acre site offers stream fishing for trout along Conant and Vinica brooks and warmwater fishing above the dam. The area has miles of trails for hiking, mountain biking, horseback riding, cross-country skiing, and snowshoeing. There are multiple trailhead parking areas. EAST BRIMFIELD LAKE, Fiskdale, Route 20. 360-acre East Brimfield Lake features two boat ramps, one located on the north side of Route 20 in Sturbridge and the other located on the south side of Route 20 in Brimfield. The lake supports largemouth bass, yellow perch, chain pickerel, northern pike, and various other warm-water fish species. A handicap accessible fishing area is located on Champeau Road in Sturbridge. Lake Siog Recreation Area (Holland Pond) is located on Dug Hill Road in Holland and offers a swimming beach, picnic tables, charcoal grills, and drinking water. Lake Siog is stocked with trout in the spring and fall. The 5.5-mile Quinebaug River Water Trail meanders from Lake Siog to East Brimfield Lake. The water trail canoe/kayak launch and parking area in addition to the Lake Siog boat ramp are located on Pond Bridge Road in Holland. Miles of walking trails are available with trailhead parking lots on Route 20 and Five Bridge Road in Brimfield, Pond Bridge Road in Holland, and Riverview Avenue in Fiskdale. HODGES VILLAGE DAM, Oxford, off Route 12. Over 25 miles of trails are maintained at Hodges Village. Opportunities include nature study, hiking, fishing, mountain biking, disc golf, hunting, horseback riding, snowmobiling, and dirt biking. Dirt bike trails are closed seasonally. A canoe launch and parking area serve the French River below the dam. The French River also is accessible for canoeing from Greenbriar Park at the upstream end of the project. Greenbriar Park, operated by the town of Oxford, provides tennis courts, baseball fields, a running track, and a skateboard park. KNIGHTVILLE DAM, Huntington off Route 112. Recreation facilities at Knightville Dam include picnic tables with grills, restrooms, and a picnic shelter. Groups may reserve the 20 x 36-foot shelter by visiting www.recreation.gov. The Indian Hollow Campground may be reserved by groups or civic organizations for a fee. Group campground reservations can also be made by visiting www.recreation.gov. Fly fishing is popular in the Little and Westfield rivers where brown-, brook-, and rainbow trout are stocked. Only artificial lures may be used in the catch and release area of the East Branch of the Westfield River from the gate just north of the parking lot on Old Valley Road north to Chesterfield Gorge. South of the gate, the daily limit is three trout. MassWildlife stocks game birds in the Knightville Basin during the upland game hunting season. Other recreational opportunities at Knightville include the Claude M. Hill Horse Trail, hiking trails, snowmobiling, cross country skiing and mountain biking west of the Westfield River, watching wildlife, and hunting. For up-to-date information, call (413) 667-3430. LITTLEVILLE LAKE, Huntington off Route 112, Littleville Road and Goss Hill Road. The 275-acre lake, with boat ramp, is stocked with brook-, rainbow-, and brown trout, in addition to native populations of warm water fish. Littleville Lake is one of the most popular fishing spots in western Massachusetts. Stream fishing for a daily limit of three trout is available along 1-1/2 miles of the Middle Branch of the Westfield River in Chester. Hunting for deer and upland game birds also is permitted at Littleville Lake in season. For up-to-date information, call (413) 667-3656. The website is

TULLY LAKE, Royalston, Route 32. Tully Lake is a beautiful 200-acre gem, popular among hikers, picnickers and paddlers. There are two boat launching areas: motorboats up to the 10-horsepower limit may be launched at the ramp at the Tully Lake Recreation Area; canoes and kayaks may be launched at the Tully River Canoe Launch. Anglers catch bass, perch, black crappie, and pickerel from the lake and Long Pond. Trout are stocked by MassWildlife north of State Route 68 in Royalston. There are trails for mountain biking adjacent to the Tully River, and hiking around the lake and to nearby waterfalls. The picnic area has pit toilets, tables, and grills, but no running water. A 44-person picnic shelter may be reserved for a fee. An 18-hole disc golf course lies on the south side of the lake. Tully Lake Campground offers 36 tents-only campsites each with a fire ring and table, accessible by foot or boat. Operated by the Trustees of Reservations on the shore of Tully Lake, the campground offers access to over 20 miles of hiking trails including the Tully Trail, and the Lake Trail, with scenic vistas and waterfalls. WEST HILL DAM, Uxbridge, between Route 16 and Route 122 on East Hartford Avenue. There are two miles of stream fishing along the trout-stocked West River. Bass, pickerel, and hornpout also can be found in the river. West Hill Dam offers picnic tables, grills, portable toilets, five miles of hiking trails, ten miles of mountain bike trails, hunting and picnic shelter rentals. Two picnic shelters in West Hill Recreation Area 30 feet x 44 feet and 20 feet x 36 feet, each having picnic tables and grills may be reserved for a fee by contacting the Park Ranger staff at (508) 278-2511.

WESTVILLE LAKE, Southbridge and Sturbridge, Wallace Road off Route 131. Fishing for stocked trout is popular in the Quinebaug River upstream of Westville Dam. 23-acre Westville Lake supports largemouth bass, yellow perch, chain pickerel, and various other warm-water fish species. Westville Lake Recreation Area features handicap accessible parking, restrooms, drinking water, ball fields, boat launches, and numerous picnic tables with charcoal grills. Miles of trails are available for hiking, cross-country skiing, and snowshoeing. Two picnic shelters, 30 x 44-foot and 20 x 40 foot, can be reserved for a fee. Shelter reservations can

BLACKWATER DAM, Webster, Route 127. This scenic area offers visitors approximately 3,600 acres of land and water recreation. There are several miles of open trails for hiking, horseback riding, snowshoeing, snowmobiling and crosscountry skiing. The pristine environment includes a meandering eight-mile stretch of the river which provides excellent canoeing and kayaking opportunities. Hunting and fishing are also available on the property in accordance with state and local laws. Interpretive programs are available throughout the year and on request. EDWARD MACDOWELL LAKE, West Peterborough, Route 101. The developed recreation area at Edward MacDowell Lake (located at the dam) provides a beautiful and peaceful place for recreation and reflection. Facilities include picnic areas with water, grills, and restrooms, a swimming beach, playground, horseshoe pits, volleyball area, boat launch and hiking trails. Two picnic shelters (20 x 35-foot and 30 x 50-foot) may be reserved for a fee (www.recreation.gov or 1-877-444-6777).

FRANKLIN FALLS DAM, Franklin, 46 Granite Drive, Route 127. This scenic area offers visitors over 3,900 acres of land and water recreation. Several miles of multiuse trails are available for hiking, biking, horseback riding, snowshoeing, snowmobiling and cross-country skiing. One-track bike trails developed by the New England Mountain Bike Association surround the grounds of the project office and over 15 miles of groomed snowmobile trails wind along the river throughout the property. An 18-hole disc golf course is available free of charge starting at the Franklin Falls Dam front parking lot. Developed recreational areas such as Profile Falls offer a picturesque waterfall, picnic shelter, and restroom facilities. Coolidge Woods recreation area offers excellent canoe and kayaking opportunities, and Ledgeview Overlook recreation area provides a scenic view of the dam as well as picnicking. HOPKINTON-EVERETT LAKES, Hopkinton, Route 127. Two developed parks are available at Hopkinton Everett Lakes. Elm Brook Park (off Route 127) is operated by USACE and offers a swimming beach, picnic areas with water, grills and restrooms, athletic field, nature trail, boat ramp, and a model airplane flying field. Four picnic shelters, ranging in size from 20 x 30-foot to 30 x 60-foot, may be reserved for a fee (www.recreation.gov or 1-877-444-6777). There is a user fee charged to enter Elm Brook Park. BALL MOUNTAIN LAKE, Jamaica, Route 30 or Route 100. The West River provides good to excellent river fishing for brown trout downstream of the dam and in some sections upstream of the lake. The 75-acre lake provides some smallmouth bass fishing. A canoe/kayak launch is available on the lake, but no trailers are allowed. A small picnic area with tables, grills and gazebo is located along the access road to the dam. Winhall Brook camping area is located off Route 100 in South Londonderry and features 111 campsites. The camping area is open from the third Friday in May through Columbus Day. Maximum of six adults on a site. Maximum of two tents or one hard wheeled unit and one tent allowed per site. Six adults and children under 18 are covered by the site fee. There are a limited number of electric and water hookups. Three-sided lean-to shelters also are available for a slightly higher fee. Firewood is available for purchase. Restrooms, showers, trails, volleyball court, basketball court, horseshoe pits, playgrounds and drinking water are available in the area. Pets must be on a 6-foot (or less) leash at all times.
